r Judith Laprade, Assistant Professor of Department of Rehabilitation Sciences, represented Hong Kong to participate in the Asian Beach Volleyball Tour last month. The tour consisted of three legs: one in Philippines and two in Thailand.

Started to play indoor volleyball at the age of 12, Dr Laprade transitioned to beach volleyball when she was in university. A coach for both indoor and outdoor volleyball for about three years, she has played on a local tour in Canada for two years and then the national tour for four years.

Not long after she arrived in Hong Kong last year, Dr Laprade was asked by the Hong Kong Volleyball Association to develop the women's beach volleyball programme. Since last November, she has been training together with her local partner. The opportunity to apply to go to the Asian tour came in February and Dr Laprade's team was eventually selected to go on the tour.

Dr Laprade was very excited at the opportunity, particularly it was the first Asian tour she had participated in. "It is an honour to represent Hong Kong and a thrill to be able to travel to different countries and compete against so many good teams. After spending the entire competition with them, it's like being with friends and we hate to leave them. But we know it's not long to the next tour stop," said Dr Laprade.
