The selection of this annual award is based on five equalweighting criteria: academic achievement, leadership, involvement in extra-curricular activities, community service experience and exposure, and personal qualities.

Each academic department is allowed to nominate only one candidate who has to compete with other nominees in the same faculty for the award.

Design student tops in international street furniture design contest

A piece of street furniture called "Raindrop" has won for her designer, Rony Chan, a third-year student of the School of Design, the Gold Prize of Singapore's VivoCity Student

Design Contest. Miss Chan defeated more than 350 contestants worldwide with her design composing four "raindrops" painted in gradient blue and made of translucent polycarbonate and it enables people to rest in a nature-like environment.

Organized by the Singapore real estate company, Mapletree Investments Pte Ltd, the developer of VivoCity, and DesignSingapore Council, this inaugural Contest aims to nurture the artistic talent of students and promote design excellence in street furniture. The competition carried the theme of "fluidity" matching the unique architecture of VivoCity, which is the work of the internationally renowned Japanese architect, Toyo Ito.

As the Gold Prize winner, Miss Chan was awarded a total of S\$10,000 (around HK\$48,000) and another S\$10,000 for PolyU. Her design will also be produced for display at VivoCity.

Earlier in January 2006, Miss Chan joined three other finalists for a three-day trip to Japan to study under Toyo Ito. The experience was invaluable to

her future creations.

U niversity students can contribute to the betterment of the local retail industry. This is the aim of setting up the Sincere Scholarship for Innovation in Retailing by the Sincere Company Limited years ago. This contest for scholarship is open to 2nd year students studying in higher diploma and bachelor degree programmes of the Institute of Textiles and Clothing (ITC).

This year, three talented students defeated 80 other contestants and took away the Gold, Silver and Bronze Scholarship Awards, which worth \$12,000, \$8,000 and \$5,000 respectively. The other three finalists each received a prize of \$2,000.

To enter the competition, students had to write business proposals with contents relating to the competitive edge of department stores, reference standards of the retail industry, periodic cycle of retail sales, human resources management in retail industry or global trends affecting the local retail sales environment.
