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


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Message from

Director of School



As the new year gathers pace it is a good time to think about beginnings. The SHTM has a proud tradition of graduating students who suit the rigorous requirements of the hospitality and tourism industry, leaving us to commence a new phase of their lives. Likewise, November 2007 marked a new phase for the School. With PolyU having adopted the practice of supplementing the University-wide graduation ceremony with separate events for each faculty and school, the first SHTM graduation ceremony took place. As we report in this issue, the two-part ceremony was a time for reflection and looking ahead. My congratulations go to all 539 graduates.

December last year marked another beginning featured in this issue – the First International Forum on Tourism Education held at the Guilin Institute of Tourism. The event capped a year of cooperation with the Institute in its drive towards university status. Combined with the School's co-organisation of the Fourth China Tourism Forum in Kunming two days later, the event reflects our diligence in fostering dialogue between tourism academics and practitioners in the mainland.

Closer to home, the recently launched Hong Kong Tourism Demand Forecasting System, developed by the SHTM and PolyU's Public Policy Research Institute, should have an important influence on the industry. The web-based system, described later in this issue, provides inbound tourist demand forecasts for up to 10 years.

With excavation work now underway at the teaching hotel site in Tsim Tsa Tsui East, the School has invited interior designers to propose sophisticated, open layouts with an Asian touch that feature greenery. As we mention later, this will be a challenge but it will differentiate our hotel from the many nearby commercial establishments.



NEW BEGINNINGS

2 007 marked a new era for PolyU, with the University-wide graduation ceremony supplemented by individual faculty and school events for the first time. The SHTM grasped the opportunity with typical enthusiasm, holding a two-part graduation ceremony on 7 November for 5 PhD, 2 MPhil, 132 MSc, 2 PgD, 150 BA, 69 BSc and 179 HD students who completed their studies in the 2006/2007 academic year.

Presenting his opening address at the ceremony, SHTM Director Professor Kaye Chon mentioned that 'commencement' was perhaps a more appropriate word for graduation. Noting that the students now had to fulfil their potential, he told them that "you are commencing another chapter in your lives."

The ceremony itself was a celebration of that new chapter. Both morning and afternoon sessions featured processions of graduating students in caps and gowns, accompanied by SHTM staff members, parents and industry guests as they made their way with much excitement across the PolyU campus to the Jockey Club Auditorium. Complementing both processions were two bagpipers in full Scottish dress.

Dr Lam Tai-fai, Member of the University Council, officially declared the morning session of the ceremony open, and Dr Ng Tat-lun, Deputy Chairman of the University Council, performed the honour in the afternoon session.

Both sessions of the ceremony featured guest speakers and valedictory speeches by graduate

representatives. Mr Brian Deeson, Senior Vice President – Asia Pacific for ACCOR Hospitality, gave the morning address, saying that instead of talking about the many changes he had seen in his 41 years in the business, he wanted to focus on those things that had stayed the same. "What hasn't changed is the fundamentals", he said. "We are in the business of hospitality and service, the business of 'building dreams', and we must never lose sight of that."

Noting that SHTM graduates are uniquely placed to take advantage of the tremendous opportunities presented by mainland China, which would very soon be the world's largest tourism market, he urged them to never forget these fundamentals and hoped they would continue to feel "the thrill of making customers happy" in China or anywhere else in the world.

In his address to the afternoon session, Mr Clement KM Kwok, Managing Director and CEO of the Hong Kong and Shanghai Hotels Limited, emphasised the importance of a 'can do' attitude and of always seeking extra challenges. He offered the students four

pieces of advice: "enjoy and make the most of every day", "be passionate and committed to your job", "speak up and give your views" and "love people".

Mr Kwok ended his speech with the story of a woman whom he said embodied all of these qualities: Ms Rainy Chan, the first female and Chinese General Manager of the Peninsula Hong Kong and a new member of the SHTM Advisory Committee. He explained that Ms Chan had worked her way up from front office cashier to the high position she is in today. "I hold her up as an inspiration for all of us", he said.

Ms Kris Yung Pui-I, who was graduating with a BSc(Hons) in Tourism Management, harkened back to Professor Chon's idea of 'commencement' in her valedictory speech in the morning, noting that "I do not see this ceremony as the end of our studies, but as a new beginning". All of the graduating students had already proved their worth by studying in a world-class institute, she said, and now it was time for them to "prove their value to industry and to society".

Ms Yung concluded with a rousing exhortation: "Fellow graduates, it's time for us to excel!"

The value of showing respect to and helping customers from all walks of life was the focus of the afternoon valedictory address. Ms Lilian Yeung Chung-huen, a BA(Hons) graduate in Hotel, Catering and Tourism Management,

shared her experiences as a management trainee in Pattaya and Beijing, during which time she was able to use the valuable communication skills she had developed at the SHTM.

"We are privileged to have been exposed to different environments and cultures," Ms Yeung said. Quoting Tom Brokaw, she urged her fellow graduates to think of their new academic qualifications as their "ticket to change the world".

The SHTM congratulates all of the graduates, and wishes them well as they commence the most exciting phase of their lives! •

Practical and Beneficial Demand Forecasting System Launched

The tourism industry, government and academics alike will benefit from the Hong Kong Tourism Demand Forecasting System according to project leader and SHTM Associate Director, Professor Haiyan Song. Jointly developed by the SHTM and PolyU's Public Policy Research Institute, the online system was soft-launched to industry and government guests in late November.

Speaking at the launch, Professor Song described the system as "very interesting, practical and beneficial." The web-based system, housed at TourismForecasting. net, projects tourism demand in Hong Kong for up to 10 years, as measured by expected tourist arrivals and departures, expenditure and hotel room nights. Arrivals, departures and expenditure are grouped by 10 major countries and regions, and room nights by type of tariff.

All of the forecasts, generated by econometric methods and adjusted by experts, will be updated on a quarterly basis, ensuring that subscribers always have the most advanced data at their fingertips.

This, said Professor Kaye Chon, Director of the SHTM and member of the project team, means that "tourism practitioners can gain first-hand information on future trends", which in turn "will be beneficial to business development and policy making". Most importantly, it will allow industry practitioners to implement suitable

medium- to long-term tourism strategies, and provide academics with valuable research input.

Culminating three years of very hard work, the soft-launch was testimony to the enthusiasm of the SHTM team members, including Professors Song and Chon, Associate Professor Kevin Wong and Visiting Professors Stephen Witt and Gang Li. Professor Chon noted that innovative projects like this are "one of the reasons why the School is rated highly".

The system devised by the team offers basic information on tourism demand to members of the public, but subscribers benefit from the full range of its features, including quarterly reports and the ability to generate alternative forecasts by incorporating different economic growth projections into the calculations. Annual subscription costs US\$2,400, and more information is available from Miss Eling Yim at hmeling@polyu.edu.hk.

The official launch of the system will be held in March, and is sure to mark a new chapter in accurate and accessible tourism demand forecasting for Hong Kong.



Excavations are underway at the SHTM teaching hotel site, with the interior design plan to be finalised by the middle of the year. This is an exciting time in the development of the hotel, which will house the School, its teaching and research facilities and an operational hotel.

With the exterior design finalised in September last year, the 29 storey hotel will be "a new landmark in the Tsim Sha Tsui East area", according to Professor Kaye Chon, Director of the SHTM. When completed, the hotel will include 278 guest rooms, with more than half including harbour views.

A New Landmark

Excavation work should be completed in the second quarter of this year. With a height limit imposed on buildings in the area, the basement will stretch down 22 metres, offering 4 levels dedicated to car parking, back of house operations, kitchens and function rooms.

The hotel interior will boast a spacious, elegant design. Professor Chon said that the brief is asking for sophistication rather than opulence to differentiate the SHTM hotel from the range of commercial hotels in the district.

Interior designers are currently working with the themes 'unique' and 'deluxe', with a distinctly Asian touch that includes elements of greenery. This will provide a layout that is different and a little unconventional, but very welcoming. As Professor Chon remarked, "it will be a big challenge for the interior designers to nicely combine all these elements."

The University is currently considering names for the hotel, with a chief concern to reflect PolyU's vision and mission while recognising the hotel as an independent operation. The hotel will open in 2010 to further extend the education and research offerings of the SHTM, already the leading hospitality and tourism school in Asia.

Hotel Industry House of Innovation

Prototype guest rooms that advance hospitality and tourism research will feature in the new hotel. Developed in collaboration with industry partners and situated on a single floor, the rooms will showcase new technologies, designs and business concepts. Having invited expressions of interest from the industry, PolyU is looking to build a true house of innovation.



Conferences Keep Pace with Tourism Development


The SHTM continued its leading role in bringing together mainland tourism academics and practitioners by co-organising two significant forums last December. The First International Forum on Tourism Education was held in Guilin, Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region, on 12-13 December, and the Fourth China Tourism Forum took place in Kunming, Yunnan, on 15-16 December.

Speaking of the School's role in co-organising the events, Professor Kaye Chon, SHTM Director, said that "with China experiencing strong demand for international and domestic tourism, it is important for the country to keep pace with the trend of tourism education development around the world". Paired with this, he noted, was the need "to examine closely issues facing the tourism industry in China".

Open Dialogue on Emerging Issues in Guilin

The First International Forum on Tourism Education in Guilin brought together Professor Chon's two concerns, focusing on the internationalisation of tourism professionals in mainland China by enhancing tourism education and training.

Held in conjunction with the United Nations World Tourism Organisation (UNWTO) and the Guilin Institute of Tourism, the forum was part of the UNWTO project to raise the Institute to university-level status. Other organisers included the Government of the Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region, the Guangxi Zhuang Tourism Bureau and the Guilin Tourism Bureau.

A feature of the two-day event was the impressive mix of keynote speakers and panel discussants drawn from the tourism industry and educational institutions, including Mr Vicente Moles, Director of Themis Foundation for the UNWTO, Mr Chen Xian-chun, Head of the Human Resources Department at the China National Tourism Administration, Mr James Lu, Executive Director of the Hong Kong Hotels Association and the SHTM's Professor Chon, amongst many others.

Professor Chon also led a lively panel discussion on tourism education from the student perspective, in which a number of students, including SHTM PhD research student Mr Alexander Grunewald, had the opportunity to put forward their views. Another panel

discussion, chaired by Associate Professor Hanqin Zhang, considered the different modes of training tourism professionals.

The SHTM's Associate Director, Professor Haiyan Song, chaired keynote presentations on both days that addressed the impact of tourism development trends on, and the prospects of, tourism education in mainland China.

Other thought-provoking subjects featured at the forum included education and knowledge management in tourism, specialised research on the programme structure of tourism education, and work-integrated education.

Sustainable Tourism Development the Focus in Kunming




Participants at the Fourth China Tourism Forum in Kunming

The Fourth China Tourism Forum in Kunming also drew together industry leaders, academics and students, taking community-based tourism as its theme.

Organised by the SHTM, the UNWTO and the School of Business and Tourism Management at Yunnan University, the forum focused on the impact of tourism in the less developed areas of China. This is particularly important in Yunnan with its ethnic diversity, high potential for culturally based tourism and spectacular scenery balanced against high levels of poverty.

The forum sought to identify issues related to sustainable tourism development, with other themes including ecotourism, heritage and cultural tourism, rural tourism and security in tourism destinations.

Speakers included eminent academics and practitioners such as Professor Wu Song, President of Yunnan University, Mr Hua Zefei, General Manager of the Yunnan Expo Group, Professor Peter Murphy, Foundation Professor of Tourism and Hospitality at La

Trobe University in Australia, the SHTM's Professor Kaye Chon, and Mr Cliff Wallace, Managing Director of the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre.

The panel discussions included emerging issues in the hospitality and tourism industry in mainland China, moderated by SHTM Associate Director, Professor Cathy Hsu, and ecotourism and sustainable development. A concurrent session on the forum's final day tackled such issues as

regional collaboration, tourism development strategies and heritage tourism.

The Fifth China Tourism Forum will be hosted jointly with the Tourism College of Huangshan University and held in Huangshan, Anhui, on 13-14 December 2008.

Another event to note this year will be the Fourth International Forum on Chinese Outbound Tourism on 14-16 April. Hosted in Beijing by the China National Tourism Association, the UNWTO and the Pacific Asia Travel Association, the event will be co-organised by the SHTM and Ivy Alliance Tourism Consulting. The forum's theme will be 'Approaching the Destination', and further information is available at www.outboundtourism.cn/english/intro.asp.

New Hotel Management Programme Launched in Guilin

The SHTM's involvement with the United Nations World Tourism Organisation (UNWTO) project to assist the Guilin Institute of Tourism upgrade to university standard entered an exciting new phase in October last year. With the launch of a Diploma in Hotel Management after a year of planning and development, the efforts of the SHTM team are beginning to pay off.

Commenting on the new programme, Project Director Professor Haiyan Song said that "the feedback from students is very encouraging, and the teachers are adjusting to the new learning methods and curriculum model".

As few textbooks were available in simplified Chinese for many of the new subjects, Institute teachers were trained in Hong Kong and wrote detailed work schemes, including lesson plans, tutorial materials and assessment tasks. An online learning management system was put in place by the SHTM team for other activities such as a bulletin board and grade book completion to complement these new materials. However, Project Manager Mr Paul Penfold noted that a shortage of computers still hinders the students from making best use of these resources.

Two cohorts of 30 students have joined the programme, with admission requirements set higher than usual to attract exceptional candidates. A quality assurance system has been developed, a programme committee is now operating and an advisory board has been confirmed. Professor Song and Mr Penfold attended the first two programme meetings in November and January to monitor progress.

The programme will soon have available the purpose-built food and beverage facilities of a new International Exchange Centre, which is scheduled to open in March. The SHTM's Dr Jacksa Kivela and Mr Guenther Karch were instrumental in reviewing plans and providing input into the design and layout of the centre, and also lent guiding hands to equipment purchasing.

Thought Provoking

S enior hospitality managers from Hong Kong, mainland China, Thailand, Indonesia, Korea and Germany had the opportunity to gain insights into the many challenges facing the industry at the Hong Kong Winter School in January this year. This was the sixth annual Winter School held in conjunction with the Hong Kong Hotels Association.

Continuing the trend of innovative executive training programmes hosted by the SHTM, the Winter School offered three intensive workshops that stretched over two days each.

Featuring cutting-edge research and management concepts, the thought provoking workshops were jointly conducted by top industry professionals and leading academics from the SHTM and US universities.

The first workshop focused on human resource management, with Dr Dennis Reynolds of Washington State University emphasising the need for service firms to leverage their human capital to enhance service quality, gain consumer loyalty and boost profits. Professor Robert Bosselman of lowa State University addressed the different approaches required to manage a multi-generational workforce, giving participants the tools to communicate successfully with both older and younger workers.

The second workshop featured a financial management workshop conducted by Dr Basak Denizci of the SHTM and Mr Thomas Maier, Vice President of Hotel Operations at the Red Lion Hotels Corporation. The pair equipped participants with important knowledge on assessing value-creating investment options and managing revenue through the art and science of real-time customer demand prediction at the micro-market level.

The programme closed with a service quality management workshop led by Professor Kaye Chon, SHTM Director, and Mr William Mackay, Regional Vice-President and General Manager of the Four Seasons Hotel Hong Kong. Professor Chon used hospitality industry case studies to address the demand for service quality in today's rapidly changing socio-cultural, economic and political environment. With the help of practical models, Mr Mackay tackled the relationship between people management, service quality and corporate culture and its impact on the bottom line.

The seventh Hong Kong Winter School will be held in January next year.

Penfold received a Service Excellence Award.



He has also organised the China Tourism Forums for the past four years, which have generated substantial interest from both academics and practitioners in mainland China. After receiving the Research Excellence Award he modestly said that "this recognition also reflects the influence of our School on China's hospitality and tourism research and

October 2007 was a busy month for study trips, with students exposed to a variety of hospitality and tourism operations in Guangzhou, Shanghai and South Korea. Leaving behind the familiarity of the PolyU campus, they gained practical insights into how the tourism industry operates in other parts of Asia.

Mr Shing Tak Pang, a Higher Diploma in Hotel Management student, returned from the trip to Guangzhou's Novotel Baiyun Airport Hotel full of enthusiasm. "All of us benefited a great deal from this tour," he said. "Not only did it stimulate our thinking, but it also helped us realise the importance of rooms division management."

And that was exactly what the tour leader, Assistant Professor Catherine Cheung, had in mind when she planned the trip. After attending a series of talks by the hotel's management, said Dr Cheung, the students gained "a better understanding of hotel guest profiles and the complexities and challenges of the rooms division at an airport hotel".

Another group of students learned more about the hotel business in the mainland through a four-day visit to Shanghai. Eighty-six BSc(Hons) and Higher Diploma in Hotel and Tourism Management students took in Le Royal Meridien, the Sheraton Shanghai Hotel &

Residences and the Pudong Westin Bund Centre Shanghai, as well as a number of tourist attractions.
