Teaching/Learning Methodology	In addition to conventional lectures delivered by the subject lecturer, teaching and learning activities which involve students' active participation will also be used. These activities may include class exercise, discussions in small groups and report back to the class, reading and discussions of appropriate articles and newspaper cuttings on current social policies and related services issues, role playetc. Audio-visual materials will also be shown to facilitate learning and to increase students' understanding of specific topics.	
	Through seminar presentations, students would have opportunities to integrate the knowledge and concepts learnt in the class and demonstrate their analytical ability.	
	Another important learning approach adopted is observational visits. Visits to different social welfare agencies will be arranged for students.
