Objectives	<p>The subject aims at familiarizing students with the basic research methods for gathering basic information for social policy formulation, assessment and development. Specifically, quantitative and qualitative methods commonly used in policy research and assessing policy impacts, such as data extraction (especially from Census and government sources), trend analysis, bench marking, focus group interviews and stakeholder analysis will be explored.</p>

A basic understanding of the methods commonly used in social policy research in government and non-government institutional contexts. b. Ability to conduct basic social policy research and perform specific tasks for collecting data for policy formulation, assessment and development in comparative contexts. c. Knowledge to prepare policy research and participate in the process and assess the consequences associated with social policy formulation, analysis and development.

Interactive lectures and workshops are expected to be conversant with the common paradigms and frameworks currently embedded in understanding and practicing social policy research. Group project activities will further allow students to acquire practical knowledge, skills and specific techniques commonly required for conducting social policy research along with experiences in developing empathy, responsibility and sensitivity in performing social policy research activities.</p>

<p>Documentary Research Assignment:</p> <p>Students will write a 2,000-word literature review on the basic information they collected from library research on a selected social policy. This will allow students to demonstrate their library research skills and their competence in conducting content analysis and drawing policy conclusions from their researched materials.</p> <p>Seminar Presentation and Participation:</p> <p>Students will present their research findings on a selected policy area in seminar as assigned. They will be expected to prepare a document or PowerPoint presentation summarizing and identifying the key points emerging from their research for seminar discussion to illustrate their competence and effectiveness in public presentation and communication.</p> <p>Policy Group Project</p> <p>Students will involve in a group project designed to research on the various dimensions inherited in a selected social policy and submit a 5,000 word group report on their findings and recommendations for policy options. In this exercise, students are not only expected to demonstrate their research ability but also their capacity for working as a team, coordinating research activities and integrating findings from individual tasks to form a unified policy document.</p>
