Teaching/Learning Methodology	In addition to conventional lectures delivered by the subject lecturer, teaching and learning activities which involve active students' participation would also be used the class. These activities may include class exercise, case studies, discussion small group and report back to the class, reading and discussion of appropria articles and newspaper cuttings on current social services, role play etc. Audio-visu materials would also be shown to facilitate learning and to increase the student understanding on specific topics.			
	Seminars would be used to facilitate students to make use of the knowledge and concepts learnt in the lectures and serves as opportunities for integration and internalization. Students would be organized into small groups and they are expected to work together for a presentation to the seminar group. Relevant topics and references would be given to the students at the beginning of the semester so as to facilitate preparation of seminar presentation. Consultation sessions provided by the subject lecturer and seminar instructor would be arranged whenever necessary.

### In-class Quizzes:

Students are required to attend two in-class quizzes. They are expected to read and review all assigned readings before attending the quizzes and are expected to have basic understanding on basic concepts, definitions, competing views as well as major concerns related to those topics covered by lectures. Short-essay questions will be asked to assess how well they accomplish this. Systematic reading in pace with the subject development could be fostered also.

## Short Essays:

Two in-class short-essay writings will be required to assess students' awareness on current social policy and social service related issues. The arrangement is to arouse students' readiness to relate classroom learning to societal concerns. Students could also demonstrate how well they could apply theories and concepts they learnt in class to real life issues. On the other hand, the exercise could test students' ability to react to social policy and social service and to put forward discussions and arguments in a brief and sensible manner.

#### **Term Paper:**

Each student is required to write a term paper individually. Topics will be suggested in light of subject content, objectives as well as relevance to local context. Students are expected to demonstrate their ability to apply concepts and ideas learnt from class to concrete social policy and social service issues. Logical and systematic presentation of facts and arguments, conclusion convincingly drawn, and the ability to communicate ideas effectively will be some major criteria for assessment.

#### **Group Presentation:**

Students in groups should present in any one seminar session on a topic selected from the list of seminar topics. It is designed to help students clarify, integrate and consolidate concepts taught in class; to facilitate understanding and application of concepts learned; to promote interaction among students in smaller learning groups and to create a platform for focused discussion and exchange of ideas; and to provide a platform for students to demonstrate their understanding on the subject matter and to analyze policy theories and issues critically.
