Teaching/Learning Methodology	This subject consists of a series of relevant lectures and group discussions. Since the major aim of this subject is to develop critical thinking and analytical power, an interactive approach is adopted to encourage discussions and debates on social policy theories and issues. Debates on social policy theories and case studies will be highlighted in lectures for discussion. Students are also required to present selected policy theories in the last three lectures, through which they learn to develop knowledge in a specific area and to articulate their arguments systematically.

Explanation of the appropriateness of the assessment methods in assessing the intended learning outcomes:

Term Paper (Individual)

Students are required to submit an individual term paper of 3,000 words including title page, executive summary, tables, figures, and references. Students should choose to work on a specific social issue or a policy area that they find interesting and relevant to the subject content. Students need to conduct literature review and conceptual analysis on that topic by applying appropriate theories and models. The paper should be presented clearly in an academically relevant approach; factual evidence as well as analytical reasoning are both necessary.

Group Presentation

Students in small groups will prepare and conduct presentation on a designated topic. They are expected to illustrate their analyses of local policy issues and social problems. Data and statistics are important to substantiate their arguments. Students are also expected to motivate fellow students to take part in discussion and debate, and they also need to respond to challenges and questions appropriately. The seminar sessions will provide a platform for participatory learning; to brush up students' analytical ability and to develop skills in effective communications in policy debates.

Participation

Merits will be given to those who participate actively and constructively in class. Class attendance and participation are considered important for this course and will account for 15% of the total assessment.
