Subject Synopsis/ Indicative Syllabus	<p>1. Knowledge and Perspectives of Family and Family Welfare Definition of the family; reflection on values about individual needs, marriage and family; perspectives for understanding families: social changes, cultural values, the relationship between family and the state.</p> <p>2. Needs and problems of Families in Local Context Families with unemployment and economically stressed problems; families with extra-marital affairs problems; reconstituted families; family violence; child abuse; families with at-risk teenage children; elderly suicide; intergenerational relationship problems in families with aging family members.</p> <p>3. Policies and Services of Family Welfare Definition and concept of family policy; arguments in support of and against the development of a family policy; overview of today's families, family welfare policies and services in the contexts of developed countries and China; relationships among families, the government, and the social institutions; existing and changing policies and services for families in Hong Kong.</p> <p>4. Perspectives, Approaches, and Models for Working with Families Family processes: normalcy and development; family diversity; adult centrisim in social work practice with children; systemic, networking and ecological approach; latest intervention models, e.g. family mediation.</p> <p>5. Current Issues and Future Trend For example, family service review; current and future intervention approaches and services for families; population policy; child sexual abuse; children's rights; family care vs. community care; family stress and resilience, etc.</p>

Students will be expected to participate actively in the discussion of cases, issues, and video teaching materials.</p>
