Objectives	"Critical Introduction to Social Work" is an introductory subject in the Master of Social Work programme. This subject aims to provide students with a critical overview of the history, philosophy, values, goals, intervention modules, service contexts, and professional identity of social work. The subject will help students examine the function of social welfare, roles of social workers, and in what ways social work have helped individuals and contributed to the society.								
Intended Learning Outcomes	 Upon completion of the subject, students will be able to: (a) demonstrate a systematic understanding of the history and nature of social work as an empowering profession (i.e., its purposes, methods, philosophical base, value and ethical base). (b) recognize the core concepts, values, ideology, provision, and regulations of social work profession in the local and global contexts as well as at micro and marco levels. (c) apply a generalist framework and person in situation analysis to interpret diverse 								

	 social work practices with individuals, families, groups and communities. (d) critically evaluate different social work traditions, debates, dilemma and current issues. (e) To demonstrate a contextualized understanding of local, national and global issues, while recognizing their own professional roles and potential, and act with a sense of responsibility, pride and commitment to benefiting society with effective social work practice. (f) To develop the humanistic value commitment of professional workers to acquire both the qualities necessary to navigate the ethical dimensions of decision making, and the capacity to address the tensions inherent in the decision-making process with evidence-based judgement and innovative approaches.

Teaching/Learn ing Methodology	 Class Participation: Both performance and attendance in lecture activities will be assessed. Discussion and exercises in classes can help reflecting how students understand controversial issues which are related to social work practices. Seminar participation and presentation: sub group students will present and join actively in seminar with reference to the specific topics. Exchange of ideas and personal assertion is expected with illustration of concrete cases. The final agency visit report is treasured as a creative presentation in content while brilliant facilitation in discussion will be valued. Term paper: Appropriate literature review, systematic discussion and argumentation with personal experiences or concrete examples will be required. Students can write on their chosen topic or learning from classes. Term paper taking the agency report as reference can help reflecting students' integration of knowledge and critical appraisal of the different themes related to social work practice in actual contexts.
