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Objectives	The subject is particularly for students enrolled in the Master of Social Work programme. It aims to develop students’ scholarly ability in social policy analysis, with special emphasis on the interrelationship between current social issues/problems, social policy solutions and social service provision. Specific objectives are: 1. To examine the process of social policy formation and implementation, and its impact on social development, especially in terms of social equality and social justice. Special attention will be paid to understand the complexity and interconnectedness of various social problems and policy intervention; 2. To understand the philosophical and epistemological basis of various theoretical approaches in analysing social problems and policy making, with particular emphasis on the inherited value conflicts and dilemmas in the process; 3. To critically evaluate the various approaches in social policy analysis, and their relevance and applicability in local context; and 4. To help the students to review their own values and approaches in analysing social problems and social policy so as to develop a more reflective attitude in their professional practice.									

Intended Learning Outcomes	Upon completion of the subject, students will be able to: - Show their understanding of the current debates and discussions about social issues and policy reaction; - Acknowledge the arguments inherited in various theoretical perspectives of social problem and policy analysis, reviewing how they can be applied in the local context, accounting for their strengths and weaknesses; - Develop their own framework for analyzing social problems, social policy and development issues with clear vision for social accountability in professional practice; - Articulate and initially reflect on values and philosophies in analyzing social problems, social policy, and social development; and - Review critically the current social policy provisions in addressing social problems in local context

Teaching/Learning Methodology	This subject aims at providing further training to students in developing fuller ability in understanding social policy and its connection with social problems and social welfare. Students are required to integrate policy and social analysis, incorporating social, economic, political, and cultural contexts. An interactive approach in which dialogues and debates are featured in lectures and policy presentation to assist students to consolidate their knowledge. Students will also conduct their own policy analysis in their assignment by developing their topic of interest, selecting an appropriate framework, and analyzing the underlying social issue.
