	Practice Wisdom in Social Work Practice, Profession and Education Current Issues and Arguments in International and Indigenized Social Work Practice, Profession and Education		
	These three elements are inter-related in formulating the social work doctoral thesis. Practice research implies it can be a qualitative study, and/or a quantitative study on social work practice, profession, and education. Practice wisdom relates to knowledge, insights, values and intervention generated or accompanied within social work practice, professional reflection as well as teaching and learning in social work education. Related issues and arguments refer to current controversies in social work practice, profession and social work education. To name a few, it may be controversies such as evidence based practice versus reflective practice, clinical social work versus generic social work; professionalization versus deprofessionalization of social work, as well as globalization versus indigenization of social work. Within these three inter-related components, there may be numerous combinations of research topic and concern. Below are some examples;

	 issues; a qualitative study on client participation in social action or community development; or 		
	- a quantitative studies on related issued in social problem, social welfare, and social development.
