Also assess the expected morphological response under natural or human-induced changes, which may affect one or more of the following drivers: mean sea levels, wave climate and other hydrodynamic processes, as well as sediment budget.</li> <li>c. Discuss the nature and complexity of problems a coastal engineer will face regarding coastal protection against flooding and erosion in view of climate change.</li> <li>d. Master the basic principles related to designing and evaluating methods for protection against flooding and erosion.</li> <li>e.
