Objectives	<p>This course introduces key concepts concerning the studies of Dunhuang. It highlights the uniqueness of Dunhuang, the city situated at the historical, cultural and geographical juncture, linking China to the outer world. Students will be able to forge their knowledge in the areas of Chinese and Eurasian history, archaeology, religious studies, translation studies, music and arts, as well as the integration of humanities and technologies.</p>

	<p>Explanation of the appropriateness of the assessment methods in assessing the intended learning outcomes:</p> <p>The final quiz, comprising 3-4 open-ended questions, will help students gauge the key concepts covered in the lectures. Reading requirement will be reflected in the final quiz.</p> <p>Oral presentations or group projects scheduled in tutorial sessions can best assess the students’ overall grasp of the knowledge and skills learnt.</p> <p>The individual term paper of 1,500-2,500 English characters, finalized in accordance with the instructor’s comments and feedbacks, will best assess the students' command of the knowledge and skills learnt from the subject and their ability to present specific aspects of the subject. Students must obtain a D or above on the EW assignment to pass the subject.</p> <p>Students’ active participation in lectures, tutorial discussions and online Blackboard learning is essential in ensuring students’ understanding and improving presentation skills.</p>
