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#### PLACE Camp 2018 – Exploring BAESP (19 July 2018)

The PolyU Language and Culture Exploration (PLACE) Camp organised by the Faculty of Humanities (FH) was held from 17 – 20 July 2018. This was the second year that FH organised the camp. This year, the camp attracted 100 secondary/high school students from Hong Kong and other parts of the world, including Bangladesh, Cambodia, Malaysia, and Taiwan. The Camp provided participants with the opportunity to experience university student life at the Faculty. Our BA (Hons) in English Studies for the Professions (BAESP) programme offered a one-day activity on 19 July for participating students to gain hands-on experience and knowledge about different aspects of English language.

Three practical workshops were held in the morning: "Modern fashionable language in English", "How language betrays our emotions", and "When silence is not golden: Communication disorders in children and adults". In the afternoon, our BAESP students discussed their study experiences at a sharing session in addition to two other workshops, which were "How do you communicate across cultures?" and "We're all linguists… aren't we?".

Through the camp, participants gained valuable insight into the fields of English and linguistics. They also met new friends from various local and overseas schools and were able to interact with and learn from our helpful and friendly teachers and staff.

## **Programme Orientation for MA Students (1 September**

Around 40 new students from the MA in English Studies for the Professions (MAESP) programme took part in this afternoon activity. ## Can you spot a liar? Current research on deception cues and game-based training to detect them (10 September 2018)

Most forms of traditional training that attempt to teach people the correct cues of deception fail and may even cause reactance, which produces accuracy scores that are worse than those without training. In this seminar, Professor Norah Dunbar from the University of California, Santa Barbara, USA explained that humans are resistant to training that can decrease their reliance on heuristics and biases, especially in deception detection. Prof. Dunbar and her team created a digital game, "Veracity Education and Reactance Instruction through Technology and Applied Skills" (VERITAS), which helps train users to detect lies and deception. This has shown that digital games can be effective for overcoming resistance to learning and in changing people's decision-making behaviours. Prof. Dunbar also suggested that game-based training can be beneficial in helping people overcome their automatic reliance on incorrect cues, stereotypes, or "gut" reactions that can be so misleading.



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## Research Publishing Workshops for Postgraduate Research Students (14 & 28 September 2018)

The Department's Effective English for Postgraduate Research Students (EEPRS) programme organised two workshops about research publishing for PolyU postgraduate research students.

The first workshop entitled "Publishing your research: Abstract, introduction and literature review" took place on 14 September. It discussed the purpose and structure of the introduction of an abstract in a research article and, in particular, the strategies expert writers employ to demonstrate the need for their research and to highlight its value, relevance and significance. The workshop also looked at the literature review and the role of linguistic features of integral and non-integral citations.

The second workshop on "Publishing your research: Methodology, findings, discussion and conclusions" was held on 28 September. This workshop focused on the structure and linguistic features of the methods sections of research articles. The functions and features of the results and discussion sections were also examined. Issues related to the concluding sections, such as highlighting the significance of the study and acknowledging methodological limitations, were also discussed.

EEPRS is an advanced academic English programme launched in September 1998 by the Department. It provides two English courses that help full-time PolyU MPhil and PhD students deliver effective conference presentations and publish in reputable journals. It also offers one-to-one mentoring sessions that help these students improve their academic writing. #### New Minor Programme – Minor in English Communication

The new Minor in English Communication (for Science and Engineering Disciplines) aims to systematically develop the English language and communicative competence of PolyU science and engineering students for the multilingual and multicultural workplace of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. It also provides an opportunity for them to focus on a variety of written, spoken and multimodal business and professional discourse types and genres in English. The minor is designed to provide students with optimal access to the globally expanding world of media and modern communication practices in the fields of science and engineering.

Given the nature of their chosen disciplines, the kind of English that PolyU science and engineering students are proficient in may be limited to a highly technical form with which they acquire and construe knowledge. While students may find technical English adequate for their study, they will also need to demonstrate a reasonably high proficiency in non-technical English upon entering into their chosen professions. This presents an opportunity for the Department to supplement their English repertoire and raise their English proficiency by offering a new Minor programme that (1) consolidates/enhances their basic essential English knowledge and skills, and (2) enables them to communicate effectively in a variety of business and professional contexts in our increasingly multilingual and multicultural workplace using different forms of English and communication skills.

With the support of the faculties and departments concerned, the new Minor programme has been introduced to these science and engineering students through a video about the Department, posters and flyers showing highlights of the programme, and a total of 12 class visits.



## Plenary Speech Delivered at the 17<sup>th</sup> Symposium on Second Language Writing (2 – 4 August 2018)

Professor Hu Guangwei gave a plenary speech on *A testing time for testing L2 writing: A proposal for a construct redefinition* at the 17<sup>th</sup> Symposium on Second Language Writing, which took place at Simon Fraser University and the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, Canada.

The unprecedented geographical and domain spread of English in the contemporary world has cemented its status as the most widely-learned and used L2. The changing demographics of English learners/users and the diverse contexts of English use have

turned the present era into a testing time for assessing proficiency in English as an L2. Various proposals informed by the World-Englishes paradigm have been made to reconceptualize the construct of L2 English proficiency. Although writing competence is an important part of general language proficiency, these proposals have generally passed over L2 English writing assessment, presumably because written English is widely perceived to be conservative with respect to linguistic norms. In this presentation, Prof. Hu argued that the assessment of L2 English writing needs to grapple with the same thorny issues prompting a reconceptualization of L2 English proficiency more generally. In an effort to stimulate debate and research, Prof. Hu discussed several principles informing recent proposals to redefine L2 English proficiency and explored their relevance to a construct redefinition of L2 English writing competence.
