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## **Summer Programme for Local Secondary School Students (10 July 2019)**

The Department organised a one-day summer programme on 10 July, and 24 students from 16 secondary schools participated. Under the theme of "Discover the Science of English", the programme aimed at allowing students to learn English communication skills to solve real-world problems effectively in local and global multilingual settings and discover how language can be studied scientifically. These are distinctive features of our BA (Hons) in English Studies for the Professions (BAESP) programme, and the Department hopes a better understanding of the programme will attract more students to apply.

Participating students gained valuable hands-on experience and knowledge about applying English communication skills in different situations and cultures through three practical workshops, namely "When silence is not golden: Communication disorders in children and adults", "How do you communicate across cultures?" and "Multilingualism in the city". A BAESP graduate of 2018, Hanna Omila, gave a sharing session on how the study experience and student life at PolyU shaped her global outlook and professional communication skills.

More than 80% of the students enjoyed the programme and indicated they would recommend it to their friends.

The event was part of the PolyU Summer Programme 2019, which was coordinated by the Secondary School Relations Section (SSRS). The aim of the programme was to promote PolyU and its undergraduate programmes to local secondary school students.

# AASP-IALSP Workshop on "Narratives of Identity: Bridging the Divides" (7 – 9 July 2019)

The Department hosted the Asian Association of Social Psychology (AASP) and the International Association of Language and Social Psychology (IALSP) Workshop entitled "Narratives of Identity: Bridging the Divides – an AASP/IALSP Task Force". The Host organisers were Professor Bernadette Watson and Ms Ivy Wu of the Department. The aim of the Workshop was to bring early and mid-career researchers from the two organisations to collaborate and develop projects which can be presented at the International Conference for Language and Social Psychology (ICLASP), which is being held in June 2020 at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University (PolyU).

Twenty-two academics from Asia, Australasia, and the United States were organised into 3 research streams. Stream One, "Bridging the divide in healthcare", was led by IALSP President Prof. Liz Jones and Prof. Bernadette Watson, Director of the International Research Centre for the Advancement of Health Communication (IRCAHC) at PolyU. Stream Two, "Bridging the divide in intergroup relations", was led by Prof. James Liu, a past-President of AASP, and Dr Sammyh Khan from Keele University, UK. Stream Three, "Bridging the divide in personal well-being across cultures", was led by Prof. Michael Bond from PolyU and Dr Vivian Lun from Lingnan University.

#### **Orientation Events for the New Academic Year**

The Department arranged two orientation activities to help students begin the 2019-20 academic year smoothly:

Programme Orientation for MA Students (31 August 2019)

Around 80 new students from the MA in English Studies for the Professions (MAESP) programme took part in this afternoon activity. Programme Leader Dr Christopher Jenks introduced the programme and the Department to new students. He gave an overview of each of the four specialisms of the programme, which are English Language Arts, English Language Studies, English Language Teaching, and English for the Professions. He also introduced other key areas, including the Academic Support Programme, auditing of subjects, and study pathways in the Department. Dr Jenks also answered questions from students about the programme. The activity concluded with a library orientation session conducted by a colleague from the Library. Students were introduced to the many resources available to them in the Library to support their studies.


## **Departmental Seminar**

#### Doctoral Research in TESOL: Opportunities and Challenge (16 September 2019)

The field of TESOL has witnessed an exponential growth of research activities, including those undertaken by doctoral students. While some of these budding scholars make it to the top through hard work, others find it a constant struggle to get their research published and recognised by the academic community. As a Professor and Chair in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction of the Faculty of Education at the Chinese University of Hong Kong, Professor Icy Lee used her own experience as a doctoral supervisor and shared her analysis of the opportunities provided by doctoral research, as well as its challenges. She also explained the implications of these for both doctoral students and supervisors.







## **Academic Staff Wins Outstanding Article Award**

Our Dr Clarice Chan's paper titled "Proposing and illustrating a research-informed approach to curriculum development for specific topics in business English", published in *English for Specific Purposes*, has won an Outstanding Article Award from the Association for Business Communication (ABC), USA. The Award honours well-written and engaging papers that contribute significantly to scholarship and demonstrate originality of thought and careful investigation. ABC's Publication Board was "highly impressed" by Dr Chan's work and thanked her for contributing significantly to the business communication literature.

In the paper, Dr Chan proposes an approach to curriculum development for specific business English topics whereby existing research is consulted to determine the *what* and the *how* of modules on the topic of business meetings. The article illustrates how insights from existing research, in particular, studies related to business English discourse and second language pedagogy,

can be applied to needs analysis and course design, ultimately benefiting learners by research-informed courses and materials, and strengthening the link between research and pedagogy. The research-informed approach proposed and illustrated in the paper can be applied to other business communication topics.

### Connecting with Africa – Academic Visit to Ghana (28 July – 10 August 2019)

This summer, our Chair Professor Christian Matthiessen and his *PolySystemic Research Group* made an outreach to Tarkwa, Ghana, for a two-week intensive academic visit to three universities across three cities. His keynote speech at the 12<sup>th</sup> Linguistics Association of Ghana Annual Conference (LAG 2019), held at the University of Mines and Technology, Tarkwa, was captured by Ghana's state television, GTV. Prof. Matthiessen was also made an Honorary Member of LAG in honour of his contributions to linguistics and made a mentor of the SFL Special-Interest Group that was established to commemorate his historic visit. This group will potentially serve as a link between universities in Ghana and PolyU.

At the PolySystemic Symposium held at the University of Cape Coast, Prof. Matthiessen introduced his new Registerial Cartography framework for text analysis to over 160 audience members from across multiple universities. At the University of Ghana, located in the capital city of Accra, he gave a seminar on SFL theory and applications. He was also appointed a permanent External Advisor to the Department of English. Prof. Matthiessen was accompanied by some PhD students of the Department.

# Academic Staff Publishes New Book on Business Communication

Our Dr Mable Chan has finished a book with Routledge called *English for Business Communication*, which is a research-based book covering not just spoken and written communication in the workplace but also the use of Enterprise Social Media (ESM). Based on up-to-date research in business communication and incorporating an international range of real-world authentic texts, this book deals with the realities of communication in business today. It goes beyond the traditional coverage of business English to provide a broad and practical textbook for those studying English in a workplace setting.

In a review by Professor Roger Hawkins of University of Essex, Prof. Hawkins mentioned Dr Chan has produced a volume that has both breadth and depth and would offer a wide range of readers the main tools for communicating in English appropriately and effectively.

### Research on SFL and Health Communication Shared at Conference in Portugal

Professor Christian Matthiessen teamed up with Dr Kaela Zhang and Dr Locky Law, two of our recent PhD graduates, and gave two talks on Systemic Functional Linguistics (SFL) and healthcare communication at the European Systemic Functional Linguistics Conference (ESFLC2019), which took place in Leiria, Portugal from 1 – 5 July 2019. The talks were titled 100 stories that shaped public health: A corpus-based rhetorical-relational analysis and A comparison of professional medical consultations and dramatized ones respectively.

The third presentation by Prof. Matthiessen, in collaboration with our PhD student Joseph Coffie, further addressed the issue of SFL application, and was titled "Rise to the occasion": A multimodal systemic functional analysis of 'Kalahari Bitters' television commercials. Prof. Matthiessen also participated in a roundtable on multimodality to discuss studies on multimodality and to pay his tribute to Gunther Kress – a friend of his and a distinguished scholar on multimodality that passed away suddenly before the conference.

# PhD Graduate Gives Keynote Speech at Luxury Symposium 2019

Dr Esterina Nervino, our PhD graduate of 2018, was invited to give a keynote speech at the Thailand Luxury Symposium held on 30 July 2019. The topic of her speech was "Market trends reshaping the luxury retail industry."

As the Director of Retail in Asia (part of Bluebell), Dr Nervino is in charge of media brand operations including content selection, curation, edition, and media strategy. Her research interests include luxury and art, luxury and space, luxury and CSR, country of origin effect and language use, retail experience, and intercultural communication.

Dr Nervino is an awardee of the Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Scheme, and we are very pleased to see her career achievements upon graduation.

# PhD Student Presents a Paper at Metaphor Festival 2019

PhD student Winnie Zeng presented a joint paper with Professor Kathleen Ahrens at the Metaphor Festival 2019 held at the University of Amsterdam, Netherlands from 28 – 31 August 2019. The paper is titled "Metaphorical framing of 'free economy': The liberalization of economy in Hong Kong (1997-2017)" and investigates whether and how metaphorical frames of the 'free economy' concept in Hong Kong public discourse have changed over a twenty-year period (1997-2017), starting from the moment at which Hong Kong became a Special Administrative Region of China.

The preliminary analysis of 10% of the data reveals that the concept of 'free economy' was positively constructed over the whole period while the framing functions differed at critical junctures. Using the signing of the first Free Trade Agreement between Hong Kong and China on 29 June 2003 as an example, metaphors associated with 'free economy' before and after 2003 showed a very different focus. This study demonstrates the potential of Chinese political influence in Hong Kong politicians' language use for framing specific societal issues during the first twenty-years of the post-handover period.
