	Students will be assessed on a continuous basis. To facilitate language acquisition a wide range of activities is recommended. These will be carried out in teams or individually depending on the activity and the comfort level of the students. They will include: reading comprehensions, presentations, entries in internet based tools, events attendance, written assignments and tests. In addition class attendance and participation will also be taken into account in the final evaluation. Students will be expected to question and think about culture related topics introduced in class and provide their own opinions. Electronic tools will be used to promote online comments and debate amongst the students and to bring to their attention information on relevant topics.
