The topic of the seminar reported on should not be directly related to the thesis title of the student.</li> </ul>

Chief Supervisors are required to assess the report (with a pass or failure grade). Students who fail to submit a report to the satisfaction of their Chief Supervisor are required to make a re-submission until a pass grade is obtained. The Chief Supervisor has to pass the record of the seminars attended by their students and the report with a pass grade to the Research Office for custody at the end of each academic year. Students should be awarded 1 credit per year (for full-time students) or per two years (for part-time students) for completing these requirements, with an overall assessment grade of Pass or Fail.
