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Viewpoints SILK Road International Summer School 2014

Study in an Intercultural environment and Learn to be Kreative

The SILK Road International Summer School is offered by the Faculty of Humanities of PolyU, in collaboration with Xi'an Jiaotong University in the Chinese Mainland. In July 2014, students will embark on an exciting three-week journey in two cities of China -Hong Kong and Xi'an, to experience Chinese culture and study subjects related to China and its culture.

Dr Xu Xunfeng, Director of the Summer School, explained that the Silk Road International Summer School is an intensive programme designed for international students who have completed their first year of study or are first year students at colleges or universities outside Hong Kong and the Chinese mainland to deepen their understanding of Chinese culture in a real Chinese context.

Why Silk Road? According to Dr Xu, in the Han Dynasty, the ancient road started from the historical capital of Chang'an, now Xi'an. The road is not only an ancient international trade route, but also a splendid cultural bridge linking the cultures of East and West. Xi'an is also said to be the starting point of Silk Road. Adopting the name of SILK, the programme aims to serve as a starting point of students' journey to learn about China and its culture.

The SILK programme is unique and attractive in many ways, aside from experiencing the metropolitan yet very Chinese city of Hong Kong, as well as the historical cultural cross-road of Xi'an. SILK provides students with an opportunity to study two credit-bearing undergraduate subjects on China and/or culture related topics offered by the Faculty of Humanities in Hong Kong and Xi'an during the summer break. Students can choose two from four exciting subjects: "Buddhism, Daoism and Chinese Culture", "Chinese Geography and the Culture of Travel", "Loanwords: a Kaleidoscope of Cultures and Languages in Contact", and "Cultural Identities and Representations". Students will also have lessons together with students from other leading universities in other parts of the world.

These activities will allow them to participate in meaningful exchanges with students from a truly diverse background and broaden their exposure to the global community.

The Summer School is a significant move for PolyU towards becoming the leading Chinese culture course provider in Hong Kong and Greater Asia for the international communities. As Prof. Huang Chu-Ren, Dean of the Faculty of Humanities of PolyU, explains, "the FH International Summer School is our new initiative to expand our outreach to international students, and to address the growing interests of the world in learning Chinese culture".

Viewpoints

New Programmes for Teachers Teaching Chinese to Non-Chinese Speaking Students

Currently, there are about 15,600 non-Chinese speaking (NCS) students in local public schools or schools under the Direct Subsidy Scheme. Provision of adequate support such as enhanced education measures to help these students integrate into the mainstream classrooms and, thus, the community is of utmost importance. To achieve this, there is a need for appropriate training for teachers of Chinese language to provide them with the necessary skills and knowledge to cater for the needs of these NCS students.

To meet this demand, the Education Bureau launched the Professional Enhancement Grant Scheme for Chinese Teachers (Teaching Chinese as a Second Language) in March 2014. The scheme aims to encourage serving Chinese language teachers to pursue training on teaching Chinese to NCS students so as to equip them with the necessary pedagogical knowledge and skills as well as intercultural competence in performing this teaching duty.

In response to the initiative, the Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies has recently introduced two new programmes which are specially designed to enhance frontline teachers' professional ability to teach Chinese to NCS students at primary and secondary schools in Hong Kong:

- Master of Arts in Chinese Language and Literature (with a specialism in Chinese Language Teaching for Teachers of Non-Chinese Speaking Students)
 <u>Programme aims</u>: This programme helps students to acquire basic knowledge of Chinese language, literature and culture, and the know-how of teaching Chinese as second language and the necessary skills for teaching Chinese to non-Chinese speaking students.
- Master of Arts/Postgraduate Diploma in Teaching Chinese as a Foreign Language (with a specialism in Teaching Chinese as a Second Language in Hong Kong Schools)
 Programme aims: The programme develops the intellectual, critical and imaginative abilities of students in relation to Chinese language education. Specifically, it aims to develop students' awareness of and sensitivity to the differences between Chinese and other languages, and the differences between Chinese culture and other cultures. It builds on the diversity of experience that students bring to the course and extends their knowledge of Chinese language, literature and culture to develop their learning and teaching skills, enabling them to develop their careers.

Both programmes are recognised programmes under the Professional Enhancement Grant Scheme for Chinese Teachers (Teaching Chinese as a Second Language).

About the scheme

Education Bureau will offer a basic level of subsidy at 30% of the tuition fee of an entire programme of study, up to a maximum of HK\$30,000 per applicant, upon the successful completion of the relevant recognised programmes of study under the scheme.

In addition, applicants who continue to teach NCS students to study Chinese in schools offering formal local curriculum for a total of three years within five years upon their graduation will be eligible for an extra 30% of the tuition fee of an entire programme of study per person, up to an additional maximum of HK\$30,000.

Highlights New Minor Programmes

Minor in European Studies*

To be offered by Department of English in 2014/15

Minor in European Studies aims to offer PolyU students with a solid educational background in European culture and history from a multidisciplinary perspective that will enable them to successfully operate in their professions and live in the complex, globalised world. The minor offers courses on a range of topics such as film, fashion, design, history, literature, philosophy and anthropology so that students can broaden their views and understanding of diversity on the European continent, and how such diversity is construed and sustained. Such knowledge is required in a world where national interests and necessities overlap with global ones. The minor will also provide students with the opportunity to deepen and strengthen their



multilingual competence and multicultural awareness through language courses in Portuguese, Spanish, German and French. Furthermore, the minor programme will organise and promote talks and cultural and academic activities in cooperation with European consulates in Hong Kong to broaden students' perspectives on useful topics in European studies.

Minor in Chinese Language and Culture (for International Students)*

To be offered by Faculty of Humanities, Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies, Department of Chinese Culture, Confucius Institute of Hong Kong and General Education Centre in 2014/15

This programme aims to meet the needs of non-Chinese speaking students who aspire to learn Chinese language and learn about Chinese culture while pursuing a degree in PolyU. It is offered in answer to the growing interest of university students in China studies following the country's rapid economic growth in recent decades. Having a better understanding of a modernising Chinese society through the learning of its language and culture has become an important asset for many university students around the world. With a well-balanced curriculum that puts equal emphasis on Chinese language and culture, and subject contents delivered in a linguistically and culturally rich Chinese environment, it is expected that international students could benefit from this programme on their way to better understand China.

As part of its continuous efforts in nurturing students' intellectual capabilities, the General Education Centre has recently launched a public seminar series on university education. On April 8, 2014, the UGC Chairman, Mr Edward Cheng Wai-sun, SBS, JP, and Secretary-General of UGC, Dr Richard T. Armour, were invited to give a talk on "Current issues for Hong Kong's higher education" at the Jockey Club Innovation Tower of PolyU. During the talk, Mr Cheng described how he had served in the PolyU Council from 2006 to 2009 and learned from the University's motto "To learn and to apply, for the benefit of mankind." To nurture professionalism among leaders of our society, Mr Cheng emphasised the significance of educating global citizens. In this process, the UGC could contribute in two particular areas: the promotion of teaching and learning and the strengthening of internationalisation (including the engagement of the Chinese Mainland). Highlights Donation to Speech Therapy Unit

Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies has acquired a donation of approximately HK\$16 million, HK\$14.6 million of which were from Fu Tak Iam Foundation (傅德蔭基金) for the department's <u>Master of Speech Therapy</u> programme. Under the project "Training of 27 speech therapists and developing the discipline of speech therapy to serve the local community", 27 MST students who have been assessed qualified will be awarded full scholarships in the five years from 2014/15. The donation will also be used to support additional manpower and developments of the Department's Speech Therapy Unit.



Outreaching Erasmus Mundus MULTI-2 Selection Meeting in Taipei



Erasmus Mundus Mobility Programme has been one of the milestone initiatives of the PolyU's Faculty of Humanities for internationalisation. The Erasmus Mundus mobility quotas of all European and South East Asia consortium partners for the project of MULTI (Multilingualism and Multiculturalism) reach more than 170 student/staff mobilities between Europe and South East Asia.

Recently, the final round of MULTI-2 applicant selection was conducted in Taipei, with the presence of representatives from all 12 global consortium partner institutions.

Supported by the European Commission, the Erasmus Mundus Mobility Programme is well-known in Europe for providing international exchanges at postgraduate level or above. Until now, PolyU's Faculty of Humanities is the first and the only institution in Hong Kong which has received this Erasmus Mundus grant. Together with the 11 European and Asian partners, we received nearly €2.6 million mobility grant in two consecutive successful bids of applications.

With the focus on MULTI (Multilingualism and Multiculturalism), we aim to bring different academic and cultural perspectives together through language as a vehicle that carries knowledge and establishes identity, as well as linguistics as a tool to analyse this vehicle. MULTI has fostered international exchange activities among many scholars and researchers, and has facilitated numerous academic research and collaboration, which truly realise our goal of internationalisation.

The four subjects are as follows:

- Cultural Identities and Representations (CBS1A11N)
- Chinese Geography and the Culture of Travel (CC2H02)
- Loanwords: a kaleidoscope of cultures and languages in contact (ENGL2C07)

MOUs signed with NTNU and HUFS

Fostering substantive collaboration with key institutions in the fields of linguistics, applied language sciences and Chinese culture is one of the strategic priorities for the Faculty's internationalisation. During two delegation visits to Taiwan and Korea in April and May 2014 respectively, Prof. Huang Chu-ren, Dean of Faculty of Humanities, and his delegation conducted an in-depth discussion on academic and research collaborations with National Taiwan Normal University (NTNU) in Taiwan with regard to the memorandum of understanding signed with NTNU in January 2014, and signed an memorandum of understanding for collaboration with Hankuk University of Foreign Studies (HUFS) in Korea. The Faculty's delegates also successfully strengthened and established links with Hanyang University, Korea University, Kyung-Hee University and Yonsei University. Many of the above universities will be sending students to the Faculty's SILK summer school in July.

Following the success of the delegations, the Faculty of Humanities expects to work even closer with major universities in Korea and Taiwan, and to attract more students from these two places to study our undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in the future. While providing a unique experience to these international students to learn Chinese language and culture or English language in a place where East meets West, we also believe that international students will further enhance the cultural diversity of our campus and help to create a rich international and intercultural learning environment that is conducive to our students' learning.

Dr LAU Kai Yan Dustin, Assistant Professor

Dr Lau Kai Yan's research interests lie mainly in clinical psycholinguistics and neurolinguistics, reading development in Chinese, developmental dyslexia in Chinese and its assessment and treatment. He is particularly interested in phonological, morphological and orthographic processing in children with developmental dyslexia and development of clinical language assessment tools and theoretically motivated language intervention for individuals with developmental dyslexia. He is also interested in lexical processing in adult population and its neurological basis.

Dr Leung Wai-mun is currently Research Assistant Professor in Applied Chinese Linguistics, with a concurrent appointment as Associate Director of the Chinese Language Centre, Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies. Dr Leung obtained her BA and MPhil in Chinese from Hong Kong Baptist University and PhD in Linguistics from University of Hong Kong. Prior to joining the Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies, she taught at Department of Chinese of The Hong Kong Institute of Education. Her chief duty at PolyU involves curriculum development of the Chinese language component of the Discipline-Specific Requirements (DSR).

Dr Leung's research focuses on three broad domains: the use of languages in Hong Kong, Chinese language education and modern Cantonese grammar. She has published a number of papers in refereed journals such as *Studies in Language and Linguistics, Studies in Chinese Linguistics, International Journal of Linguistics, Sino-humanitas, Multilingual Education, Journal of Chinese Literary Studies, and Asian Culture and History.* She has also written three books on Cantonese sentence-final particles (2010), common Chinese usage errors in Hong Kong (2010), and trendy language expressions in both Hong Kong and mainland China (2011). Her new book on language errors will be released in mid-2014.

Dr Leung is currently a co-investigator of a research project supported by the National Social Science Fund with a special focus on Cantonese Bible published in the 19th century, which is a newly developed research interest of hers. In addition, under the support of the University Central Grant (2013-14) from PolyU, she has been constructing a "late-19th century Cantonese Bible tagged database" for diachronic studies of the Cantonese language. From March 2014, Dr Leung, as the principal investigator, has been conducting a sociolinguistic survey of language use in Hong Kong as the second 5-year review, which is a part of the longitudinal study of hers to be conducted every 5 years.

Dr Leung has been a reviewer for academic journals (*International Journal of Linguistics, Asian Social Sciences*), and local and international linguistic conferences. She has also been one of the authors of the *HKDSE Chinese Mock Exam Paper* (2011- present).

Dr Valerie Jane PEREIRA, Research Assistant Professor

Dr Valerie Pereira presented a paper on Braithwaite Oration at the 12th Indian Society of Cleft Lip, Palate and Craniofacial Society in Nagpur in 2013. The paper was entitled "The impact of maxillary osteotomy on speech outcomes in cleft lip and palate". Her article "Effect of maxillary osteotomy on speech in cleft lip and palate: perceptual outcomes of velopharyngeal function" in *International Journal of Language and Communication Disorders* won the runner-up prize for the journal's Annual Article Prize for 2013, which has been announced recently. She was invited to present her work at the 1st Annual International Congress of Oral and Dental Medicine in December (Xiamen, China) and to be a keynote speaker at next year's Craniofacial Society of Great Britain and Ireland Annual Scientific Conference. She co-wrote a chapter on "Instrumentation in the analysis and structure and function of the velopharyngeal mechanism" (In *Cleft Palate Speech*, S. Howard & A. Lohmander, Eds.) and is currently co-writing another chapter on "Assessment of speech outcomes" to be published in *Comprehensive Cleft Care* (J. Losee and R. Kirsner, Eds.). Dr. Pereira is also currently collaborating with colleagues from two



Multidisciplinary Cleft Services and Health Authorities in Hong Kong and an international scholar, to develop a Cantonese Speech Protocol for the Nasometer II 6450 (Pentax). The study also aims to develop a comprehensive normative database for the measure of nasalance which will provide useful information regarding the clinical need for and outcome of surgical intervention in cleft lip and palate.

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Clinical aspects

Dr Valerie Pereira joined Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies in August 2013 as RAP on the Master of Speech Therapy Programme. She also holds an Honorary Assistant Professor position with the Faculty of Dentistry (HKU) and participates in their joint cleft and nasendoscopy clinics. She has undertaken cleft clinical and teaching work in the UK, Sri Lanka, Uganda and Caracas. She is an internationally credentialed Speech and Language Therapist with Operation Smile and Operation Smile China Medical Missions and participated in their medical mission to Dujiangyan last November.

Department of Chinese Culture

Dr TSE Wai Kit Tse Wicky, Assistant Professor


Dr Tse Wai Kit Wicky of Department of Chinese Culture is a military historian of China. He has recently presented a

paper entitled "Cutting off the Enemy's Supply Lines' as a Strategy in Early Chinese Warfare," at The Second Annual Society for the Study of Early China Conference (March 2014), held in Philadelphia, USA. Through examinations of classical Chinese military treatises and historical records of exemplary battles and campaigns in early China, Dr Tse explains in this paper how, when, and why "cutting off the enemy's supply line" (in Chinese: 斷糧道) as an indirect approach gradually became an efficient and widely adopted strategy in Chinese warfare from the late third century B.C. onward. This research argues that the employment of the strategy of severing supply line was an answer to the strategic needs generated by the escalating scale and increasing complexity of battles and campaigns in early China, and was made possible only when certain conditions were in place. This study will advance the understanding of the development of theory and practice of military logistics in pre-modern Chinese, or even in the world historical context.

Department of English

Dr Clarice CHAN, Research Assistant Professor

Dr Clarice Chan obtained her PhD in Applied Linguistics from the University of Hong Kong. Before joining the department as Research Assistant Professor, Dr Chan held the post of Lecturer at the University of Hong Kong, where she coordinated, developed and taught a number of different English courses, and was awarded the Faculty Teaching Excellence Award of the Faculty of Arts. With a research fellowship from the Australian Government, Dr Chan conducted postdoctoral research in 2011 at the School of Education of the University of New South Wales, investigating theoretical and pedagogical issues related to English for Specific Purposes and English for Academic Purposes. Dr Chan's research interests include English for Specific Purposes (in particular, business communication and English for health professionals), English for Academic Purposes, second language acquisition, sociocultural theory, and cultural-historical activity theory. Her publications have appeared in *English for Specific Purposes, The Teacher Trainer,* the *TESOL Classroom Practice Series*, etc. She has also been a manuscript reviewer for *English for Specific Purposes* and *TESOL Quarterly*. She has recently co-edited (with Evan Frendo) a volume for TESOL, entitled *New Ways in Teaching Business English* (2014).



Research & Scholarly Activities Hong Kong PhD Fellowship 2014/15

Established by the Research Grants Council (RGC) of Hong Kong in 2009, the Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Scheme (HKPFS) aims at attracting the best and brightest students in the world to pursue their PhD studies in Hong Kong's institutions.

Two Fellowships have been awarded to FH in the HKPFS 2014/15, which represents 25% of PolyU awardees in the Humanities and Social Sciences panel and 6.9% of all PolyU's awardees.

The next call for application to HKPFS 2015/16 is expected to begin in September 2014.

Language and Multimodal Analysis Laboratory

Language and Multimodal Analysis Laboratory (LAMAL) at the PolyU Shenzhen Base is attached to Department of English, The Hong Kong Polytechnic University. LAMAL is dedicated to developing theories and methods for linguistic and multimodal discourse analysis. The lab collects multimodal data such as texts, images, sounds, and videos and annotates the data using multimodal analytical methods. The annotated multimodal corpus can provide empirical basis for theory development, language learning and teaching, as well as theoretical tools for developing cultural creative industries. The lab also studies socially significant linguistic and multimodal discourses, for example, national image and TV advertisements from a social semiotic perspective, with the aim of providing practical advice to media industries.

LAMAL also aims to strengthen the connection with universities and schools across the country in the fields of scientific research and education. LAMAL is active in research through applying for national, provincial and municipal research grants. Meanwhile, LAMAL provides English language education and training services to local professionals and those from around the country by means of postgraduate programs, teacher training and projects, applied linguistics workshops, English courses for the professionals and other English-related training programs.


CHAN Chung Shun, Johnson (Faculty of Business) sharing his experience on Minor in English Language Studies for the Professions
