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Viewpoints

Internationalisation Underway: Faculty of Humanities



In line with The Hong Kong Polytechnic University's initiative of internationalisation, the Faculty of Humanities (FH) is committed to creating a global environment conducive to the development of increasingly diverse students and faculty communities. To present their views on internationalisation in FH, the Faculty Dean and Heads of FH Departments and Centres have been invited to discuss the subject from different perspectives.

Faculty Dean Prof. Chu Hung-lam stresses the importance of internationalisation in an increasingly global knowledge economy. Being responsible for shaping and delivering the curriculum which emphasises the convergence of language, culture and science, as well as carrying out research in related areas, the Faculty and its constituent Departments play a critical role in achieving a more internationalised campus. With its focus on multilingualism, multiculturalism and intercultural communication and understanding, the Faculty has been making efforts to promote internationalisation in a number of areas.

Internationalisation as a positive, culturally dynamic influence, as suggested by Dr Bruce Morrison, Director of the English Language Centre, needs to be seen through a pedagogical and socially developmental lens focusing on the University, its students, its staff and its curriculum. With regard to the staff body, the Faculty academic staff members come from a number of overseas cultures and are increasingly globally mobile with involvement in teaching, research and service in various places outside Hong Kong. In terms of our curriculum, the introduction of a wide range of Cluster Area Requirements (general education) subjects focusing on different cultures and world views is an example of how FH is very much at the centre of the University's attempt to provide a broader and more international education for PolyU students, particularly when compared to the profession-focused, more Hong Kong-centric curriculum of the previous millennium.

The Service-Learning (SL) subjects offered by FH Departments also provide opportunities for students to experience a more international education. Dr Yu Kam Por, Director of the General Education Centre, points out that not only do SL subjects such as "Social Poverty in Developing Countries" enable students to develop an enhanced understanding of and empathy for the underprivileged groups they serve, but they also provide opportunities for PolyU students to exchange and collaborate with other students and the host communities.

To elevate the Faculty's global outreach and its international standing, strategic partnerships have been built with overseas universities and professional associations. Prof. David C. S. Li, Head of the Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies, remarks that FH strives to provide students with international exposure through study abroad, academic exchange, and internship opportunities. To nurture our students' all-round development, global outlook, social and national responsibility, cultural appreciation, and biliterate and trilingual abilities, we have established partnerships with numerous universities globally. Various forms of student mobility overseas are made possible by our strong links with transnational industry partners.

Challenges and difficulties inevitably arise in the process of internationalisation. Dr Tam King-fai, former Head of the Department of Chinese Culture (Dr Tam retired in July 2017), shares that in the study of Chinese culture, part of the scepticism towards internationalisation springs from a long-standing belief that Chinese culture is so unique that, unless one is brought up in it, it is impossible even to begin to understand it. To fight against such a pervasive belief, the Department of Chinese Culture undertakes bilingual education seriously. Classes are taught in Chinese and English,

with readings that capture the best of scholarship produced internationally. Our teachers are trained in different parts of the world and their academic and research activities reach across national and cultural boundaries. We also seize other opportunities to expose our students to the value of internationalisation, such as hosting world-renowned scholars for semester-long visits and sending our students overseas on short-term study trips.

With recent research questioning some of the alleged benefits of internationalisation, the discussion shifts to another important question: How can FH achieve a truly more linguistically and culturally diversified study and work environment? More often than not, internationalisation has been reduced to a numbers game: whoever has more non-local staff and students is more internationalised. Prof. Hans J. Ladegaard, Head of Department of English, notes that internationalisation should be about learning, developing and acquiring what Mike Byram has called intercultural citizenship¹. Prof. Ladegaard shares this vision of encouraging local and non-local students and staff to engage in real dialogue through which we learn and develop; dialogue that makes us more tolerant and open-minded.

The perspectives presented by the Faculty Dean and Heads of FH Departments and Centres delineate the many shapes and forms of internationalisation: from mobility/exchange schemes for academic staff and students, international recruitment and an internationalised curriculum, to international partnerships with industry and the integration of local and non-local students and staff. The Faculty does not merely see internationalisation as a strategic instrument for development or enhancement; inter-cultural and inter-personal competence, together with world knowledge – important elements of internationalisation – have always been part of a humanities education and are at the core Faculty's values. FH will continue to support the University's initiatives and move forward in the coming years.



Dr Zhang Caicai Nominated as ‘APS Rising Star’

Dr Caicai Zhang has been awarded the ‘2016 Rising Star’ by the Association for Psychological Science (APS) in recognition of her outstanding work on the neural activities underlying the processing of lexical tones, and its relationship to music. The APS Rising Star designation recognises outstanding psychological scientists in the earliest stages of their research career post-PhD whose innovative work has already advanced the field and signals great potential for their continued contributions.

Dr Zhang’s research work is rooted in the new frontier of brain research. Her work is multi-disciplinary, bringing together linguistics, psychology and neuroscience to understand the neurobiology of language. Her work is centred on the Chinese language, not only because Chinese is relatively poorly understood, but also because Chinese has unique features that shape the brain of Chinese speakers. One unique feature is the complex tone system – Chinese has tones, whereas English and some other languages do not. She has used lexical tone as a window to probe into the complex neural processes that support the production and perception of Chinese, and as a way to understand the Chinese brain.



She uses behavioural and neuroimaging methods such as electroencephalography (EEG) and functional magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI) to investigate the neural activities sub-serving the perception and production of lexical tones in normal and disordered populations. She is currently doing three major lines of research: (1) the relationship of language and music, from the perspective of how congenital amusia, an innate musical disorder, affects behavioural performance and neural activities in lexical tone production and tone perception; (2) speaker variability in speech signals and the neural mechanisms of how listeners accommodate speaker variability in speech perception; (3) neural mechanisms (phonological computation vs. lexical access) of the encoding of Tone 3 sandhi in Mandarin in speech production.

She has published 15 peer-reviewed articles in high-impact journals, including *NeuroImage*, *Brain and Language*, *Neuropsychologia*, *Journal of Neurolinguistics*, *Journal of Speech, Language, and Hearing Research*, *Journal of the Acoustical Society of America*, and *Journal of Chinese Linguistics*, and 3 book chapters in academic books published by world-class publishers such as Oxford University Press. She has been awarded the CUHK Young Scholars Thesis Award, in recognition of the outstanding quality of her PhD thesis. She has successfully secured several external competitive grants. She is the PI of an Early Career Scheme Grant project (ECS: 25603916) and a National Natural Science Foundation of China Grant project (NSFC: 11504400); and the Co-I of a General Research Fund Grant project (GRF: 14408914).

Strengthening Ties with Malaysia, Taiwan and Europe

Faculty of Humanities (FH) has striven for building connections with various counterparts in the world to enhance the international, intercultural and global dimension of our students' learning experience, research activities and services. A number of outreaching activities were organised from January to June 2017.

Building on the closer relationship developed in recent years, FH had the honour to have YB Senator Datuk Chong Sin Woon, Deputy Minister of Education, Ministry of Education Malaysia visited the Faculty on 23 February 2017. Later in March, Prof. Chu Hung-lam, Dean (FH), led a delegation to Malaysia and paid visits to five local high schools.

In June, as invited by Chong Hwa Independent High School Kuala Lumpur in Malaysia, the Dean gave a talk on Chinese culture to the students and teachers there. Also speaking at another event themed "One Belt One Road" as invited by Malaysian organisations Gabungan Persatuan Perkembangan Budaya & Ekonomi Malaysia (馬來西亞文化暨經濟促進會) and Hokkien Association Klang (巴生福建會館), Prof. Chu gave a talk on "The Cultural Mission and Social Responsibility of Overseas Chinese".

Efforts to promote the Faculty's undergraduate programmes also included another delegation to Taichung and Tainan areas in May 2017. The delegation then visited the College of Liberal Arts of National Cheng Kung University in Taiwan in June 2017.

Another delegation was led by Prof. Chu to Freie University Berlin (FUB) and University of Vienna from 1 March to 6 March 2017. The Dean delivered a keynote speech entitled "One Scholar's Passage to Confucian Classics Learning and Ming History Study" at the International Roundtable Workshop (The Relevance of Classics Today) at FUB with over 30 distinguished scholars attended the event.

From 22 to 26 May 2017, Prof. Chu led another team of colleagues to Estonia, Czech Republic and Poland. FH was able to introduce the Faculty and its postgraduate programmes, as well as conduct fruitful academic discussions with students and staff members at a number of universities in these countries.





CBS2S02: A Special Subject, a Unique Book and a Groundbreaking Exhibition

In partnership with Tsinghua University, the Service-Learning (SL) subject CBS2S02 “Preserving Culture Heritage for Ethnic Minorities” has been awarded the “Ten Thousand People’s Scheme” (萬人計劃) under the Ministry of Education. Conducted by Dr Yu Shuo and Mr Hing Chao in Inner Mongolia since 2014, 100 students from the SL subject have interviewed Orochen and Ewenki elders in remote villages. The rich oral history collected provides important first-hand materials and knowledge for further historic, linguistic and anthropologic research on northern peoples in China and Russia.



With the information collected by teachers and students from the SL subject, a bilingual book Mountains, Oh Mountains – Oral History of the Orochen Hunters (《山上啊，山上! — 鄂倫春獵民口述史》) was produced. Together with its second volume Students Orochen Field Diary (《鄂倫春田野日記》), these books have been nominated for the National Publication Fund (國家出版基金). The National Publication Fund was established in 2007 and is the third special fund set up by China following the National Natural Science Foundation and the National Social Science Foundation.



Photos taken by teachers and students during their SL fieldwork were on display in the “Dialogue Across the Century: Photo Exhibition in Commemoration of Ethel John Lindgren’s 1930s Expeditions to Solon Banner” earlier last year. The Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies provided academic support to this exhibition organised by the Ewenki Autonomous Publicity Department, the Orochen Foundation (Hong Kong) and the Cambridge University Museum of Archeology and Anthropology. It was hoped that the exhibition would revitalise and preserve the collective memory of the community.



We are now in our fourth year of conducting summer observations and feedback to PLK teachers with a whopping twenty-five teachers from the ELC volunteering to help raise the standard of teaching by providing support to over fifty teachers this summer.

Michelle McEwan the Academic Director of the PLK Language Programmes is full of praise stating that "this helps us to improve the teaching and makes the classes more fun." She also points out that "feedback is very important for our donors to hear as it gives them independent evidence that their money is well invested."

Teachers that volunteer often reflect on their own teaching during this process but the greatest benefit is the feeling of satisfaction that we are making a difference to those more needy than ourselves.

Refugee Project in Germany and Hong Kong by BACBS and BAESP Students

With the support of PolyU Global Student Fund which encourages students to initiate projects in teams with students from overseas tertiary education institutions and become global citizens, coupled with the aim to foster students' intercultural communication and enhance leadership qualities, some enthusiastic students from the BA(Hons) in Chinese and Bilingual Studies (BACBS) programme and BA (Hons) in English Studies for the Professions (BAESP) programme joined hands with local German students from Deggendorf Institute of Technology this year and started a project targeting refugees in Germany and Hong Kong respectively. The two teams regularly made video calls to share about the ideas of upcoming events, as well as reported the results of the events held and shared the difficulties encountered throughout the project so as to learn from each other's effort.

Aiming to enhance cultural understanding, offer local students opportunities to gain insights into refugees' lives and help refugees integrate into the local community, this project was executed in Germany in the form of cultural workshops, excursions and a long-term buddy program between local German students and refugees. The project was also implemented in Hong Kong. Partnered with Christian Action, four events, namely an interactive workshop, a cultural outing, a walk tour to understand an ordinary Hong Kong refugee's daily life and a football game with refugees were successfully held in Hong Kong.

Prof. Kathleen AHRENS, Professor

Prof. Kathleen Ahrens' research interests are in the areas of cognitive linguistics, psycholinguistics, corpus linguistics, critical metaphor analysis, and language and politics. Her research outputs have been published in a number of international journals (e.g. *Text & Talk*, *Discourse and Society*, *Metaphor & Symbol*), as well as in book chapters (e.g. Routledge, John Benjamins, OUP, CUP) and she has an edited book published by Palgrave-MacMillan titled *Politics, Gender and Conceptual Metaphors*. She is also interested in exploring the stylistic issues in children's and young adult literature. She served as the Director of the International Writers' Workshop at Hong Kong Baptist University (HKBU) from 2012-2017 and has served as the International Regional Advisor Chairperson & Board Member of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators since 2008. She is Fellow and Vice President of Hong Kong Academy of Humanities.

Prior to joining PolyU in 2017, Prof. Ahrens worked as Professor and Head of Language Centre at HKBU and prior to that she was a Professor in the Graduate Institute of Linguistics and the Department of Foreign Languages and Literature at National Taiwan University.

Prof. Kathleen Ahrens received a BA in Oriental Languages and Literature from University of Massachusetts at Amherst, an MA in Chinese Language and Literature from National Taiwan University, and an additional MA and a PhD in Linguistics from the University of California at San Diego.



Department of Chinese Culture

Dr SCHOENBERGER Kevin Conrad, Jr., Assistant Professor

Dr Schoenberger graduated in 2013 with a PhD in pre-modern Chinese literature from Yale University. Since then, he has worked as a researcher and teacher at Harvard University and the University of the South. His research focuses on musical and prosodic aspects of traditional Chinese poetry and performance from a cognitive perspective. He has published peer-reviewed articles on related topics in English and Chinese and is currently completing a manuscript on musicality in late imperial Chinese drama.

Dr Schoenberger has also participated in a number of collaborative and interdisciplinary efforts. Funded by the American Council of Learned Societies and the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation, he is currently writing a book on the life and work of a late-Ming artist, Xu Wei in collaboration with other senior scholars of literature, history and art history. He has also presented his work in English and Chinese at international conferences and workshops at the University of California, Los Angeles and Suzhou University.

Methodologically, Dr Schoenberger focuses on using new techniques of cognitive science and digital humanities to offer quantitative evidence for arguments about Chinese poetry and drama's aesthetic effects.

Joint Postgraduate Student Symposium and JWLLP-VariAMU Joint Workshop

Organised by the Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies (CBS), the Joint Postgraduate Student Symposium (JPSS) on Language, Culture and Cognition cum the 22nd Joint Workshop on Linguistics and Language Processing (JWLLP) and the 5th Workshop on Variations in Action: A Multilingual Approach (VariAMU) was successfully held on 7–9 April 2017 on the university campus.

JPSS, an FH event leveraging the mandatory yearly gathering of research postgraduate students, provides an inter-institution forum for research students from different disciplines to present and discuss their work, exchange ideas and share their experiences in research. This year's JPSS kicked off the 2.5-day joint event with a presentation given by Prof. Huang Chu-ren, Chair Professor of CBS. It was then followed by 16 high quality presentations by the postgraduate students from Hong Kong, Macau and France. The presentation of the Best Paper Award (Mark Narty, ENGL; with two finalists from CBS and UMacau) and a moving tribute to our beloved Prof. Evans marked the end of the first part of JPSS.

The 8 April 2017 afternoon sessions are shared by JPSS and the JWLLP-VariAMU Joint Workshop. The joint workshop combines the fifth VariAMU workshop, which is held bilaterally with CNRS-LPL at Aix-Marseille University; and the Joint Workshop on Linguistics and Language Processing, which was previously held alternatively in Japan or Korea. Prof. Jong-Bok Kim from Kyung Hee University, Korea gave his keynote presentation and started the joint workshop officially. A total of 17 international scholars presented at the 1.5-day joint workshop this year.

This event achieved great success in many areas. First, the JPSS was organised by the students for the students under the student leadership of Xingcheng Ma (CBS) and assisted by Esterina Nervino (ENGL) as well as other FH and University of Macau members. The team won a competitive RGC postgraduate research student conference grant. Second, with more than 15 students and staff members from University of Macau, the workshop laid a solid foundation for collaboration for the future. Lastly, with high quality paper presentations and active participation from leaders of all institutions involved, including Prof. Chetwyn Chan AVP(LT), deans and associate deans from Macau, Waseda, and PolyU, as well as the past, present and future directors of the LPL-CNRS Labs, solid consensus and exciting new directions have been set for the future.



