### Human-centred innovation: an Introduction to the Research at FH

Research is fundamentally about the creation of something new and with no exception, research conducted by the Faculty also makes a vital contribution to human-centred innovation through the creation of new knowledge that spans and creates impact across a wide range of areas.

##### UNDERSTANDING OF EMOTIONS -

‘Just fine’: How machines can achieve a deeper understanding of emotions



In the age of the internet characterised by pop culture and social media, more and more people express their thoughts and emotions online than ever before. Academics have tried to develop models which can be trained to detect and classify emotions in written texts based on emotion keywords. However, human judgment is crucial and necessary given that there are other factors such as linguistic cues at various levels which can affect the emotion expressed.

The goal of our research is to develop a linguistics-based computational model that accounts for these factors, and allows machines to achieve a deeper understanding of emotions in both an explicit and implicit manner. By doing so, we will be able to create a more comprehensive framework under which emotions can be studied and analysed; better capture complex emotions expressed through the written word; and contribute to society by encouraging smarter decision-making, including allocation of resources based on the opinions of the public towards issues, people and events.

##### WHAT YOUR BRAIN CAN TELL YOU ABOUT LANGUAGE

Do you know your brain is the most complex organ in the universe? Have you ever wondered how it works?

Do you know which parts of the brain support speaking and listening, reading and writing?  
Have you thought about how language develops in a child's brain, and how aging affects the brain?

Our Language and Cognitive Neuroscience group uses brain-imaging methods to study how language is processed in the brain, such as Electroencephalography (EEG) and Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI). We are especially interested in Chinese, including Cantonese and Putonghua.

- We study how the brain handles Chinese, especially Chinese tones and its relationship to music;
- We use brain waves and brain images to detect early symptoms of dementia;
- We study speech and communication disorders of children, adults and the elderly, and try to explore efficient interventions.

### **YOUR EYES ARE THE WINDOWS TO YOUR MINDS**

Let's check out what happens inside your head when you read translations. Can your eye movements tell which translation is good and which is not? Can eye-tracking help us identify the attention focus of translation readers? Do ordinary readers who have never been trained in translation and translating teachers exhibit similar eye movements during reading? If differences are detected – how would they affect translation teaching and evaluation?

We are working on a project to examine and compare the on-line cognition behaviour between real general readers and translating teachers when they read translated texts, and assess the quality of their translation. Thanks to eye-tracking, a reliable and powerful data collection tool, we can set up links between readers' eye movement patterns and their cognitive behaviours, thus inferring what takes place during their decision-making processes. This has seldom been done in research on translation quality assessment before, as the previous investigations, which were usually output-oriented, only focused on the response of professional teachers rather than readers in real life.


### CHINESE RELIGION AND THOUGHT

World scholars have widely recognised the uniqueness of Chinese religion, overthrowing the stereotype that Chinese culture only focuses on the secular. In fact, religion has influenced every aspect of Chinese culture, but in a manner different from monotheism. In our modern world, where religious fundamentalism has become a threat, the uniqueness of Chinese religion offers alternative approaches to transcendence and self-cultivation. Our religious studies experts work on topics such as early Chinese cosmology, Daoist priestesses in the Tang Dynasty, the interplay between Daoism and popular religion, their representations in traditional novels and local legends, Chinese interpretations on Buddhist antinomianism, and religion and disability in Chinese literature.

### CHINESE HISTORY

History is a dialogue between the present and the past. We study the various aspects of Chinese civilisation from the early period to the twenty-first century. Our scholarship investigates the development of political culture, the interaction of thought and institutions, the relationships between China and its neighbours, and the transformation of warfare, providing us with the knowledge to connect the past and present to achieve a comprehensive understanding of Chinese culture and its history.

## CHINESE LITERATURE AND ARTS

With distinctive features and generations of renowned authors and artists, Chinese traditions occupy a major position in the global history of literature and arts. There have survived literary masterpieces in genres such as shi (odes 詩), ci (lyrics 詞), qu (arias 曲), fu (rhapsodies 賦), parallel prose, fiction, and drama that are both profound in meaning and beautiful in form. Calligraphers, painters, musicians, dancers, sculptors, architects, and other craftsmen have produced treasures of deep intrinsic meaning in a variety of styles. The Faculty seeks to appreciate, inherit, and promote such traditions, focusing on a wide range of topics, including female poets in ancient China, new fiction in late-Qing China, pre-modern East Asian drama texts and performance practice, Buddhist arts, female theatre in the early Republic of China and contemporary Chinese visual culture.

## Department of English

### LANGUAGE AND TECHNOLOGY

Language and technology have transformed modern life. They connect people and make life more convenient. Voice-controlled personal assistants, predictive text input on smartphones and web search engines are some of the most famous applications of language and technology. PolyU researchers are also contributing to breakthroughs in tomorrow's language and technology.


### An intelligent system for learning English vocabulary from social media



*Unleashing the potential of the internet for enjoyable English language learning in the age of social media.*

We are developing an intelligent English language learning system. With our system, everyone can learn English words and expressions in context while enjoying their favourite online videos. Based on the user's English listening and vocabulary competence, the system will recommend suitable online videos. It will also auto-generate various types of vocabulary learning activities for independent learning and revision. From now on, English vocabulary learning can become personalised, intelligent and fun!

## Conscious and unconscious attitudes towards metaphor use in psychotherapy

Metaphors describe something abstract (e.g. our emotions) in terms of something concrete (e.g. everyday objects and actions). Using metaphors may help counselling clients better express and engage with their emotions, but relevant scientific evidence is still lacking. This project uses skin conductance measurement technology and time series analysis to investigate metaphorical language patterns in patients, and explore how using metaphors might help people engage with emotions more effectively than literal language. We hope our findings on metaphor usage can improve the effectiveness of counselling sessions which, in turn, can improve people's quality of life.

## RESEARCH ON COMMUNICATION IN HEALTHCARE

One of our research focuses is on language and professional communication. In particular, we have a strong focus on healthcare. We concentrate on communication in hospitals between health professionals and patients. We have conducted a great deal of research in the Accident and Emergency department of a large public hospital in Hong Kong and have explored the patient's experience as he or she consults with a number of different health professions.

We also examine the importance of effective communication between health professionals as they manage and negotiate patient care in the hospital domain. We explore how health professionals talk to each other and to their patients in order to ensure quality patient care and accurate diagnosis. These current projects show the important role communication plays in the delivery of care and the impact on healthcare outcomes to the broader community.

### International Conference on The Relevance of Classics under the Conditions of Modernity: Humanity and Science

In commemoration of the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of The Hong Kong Polytechnic University, the Faculty of Humanities (in conjunction with the Department of Chinese Culture and the General Education Centre) and the Department of Philosophy and Humanities of Freie Universität Berlin, Germany co-hosted the International Conference on The Relevance of the Classics under the Conditions of Modernity: Humanity and Science on 5 – 7 October 2017 at PolyU.

Over 30 distinguished speakers and discussants were invited from Austria, Germany, Hong Kong SAR, South Korea, the Chinese mainland, New Zealand, Singapore, Taiwan, the Netherlands and the USA to explore how classical traditions and ideas impact, challenge and stimulate our understanding of contemporary issues and controversies in the modern human sciences and in the cultural dimensions of applied technologies around the world.

### PolyU at the WC2 Symposium in Brazil

This year's World Cities, World Class Universities (WC2) Symposium took place on 14 – 18 August 2017 in São Paulo, the economic capital of Brazil. It brought together researchers and students of international University Network from America, Europe and Asia. This year's theme of the conference was the building of an environmental city. Mr Daniel Recktenwald, a PhD student from the Faculty who participated in the Symposium, was invited to report on the event.

The Hong Kong Polytechnic University sent 8 delegates from the Faculty of Humanities, Faculty of Engineering and School of Design. The delegates learned about environmental challenges facing the city of São Paulo such as water and infrastructure, mobility and global warming, as well as actions that the University of São Paulo is taking. The city then served as a case study for a detailed review in terms of five thematic aspects of the environmental city: Transport, Eco Campus, Global Culture, Global Health and Business. In these sessions the students developed, together with the experienced professors, plans and projects to improve the situation of the cities that addressed São Paulo's many pressing issues.

Aside from the traditional workshop format, each thematic session also included excursions to environmental facilities and institutions such as a solar energy farm and the solid waste management site near São Paulo. This provided the students with the opportunity to get insights into the practical daily operations of the relevant actors. Other outcomes of the Symposium were policy suggestions and knowledge transfer to the local government. While in São Paulo WC2 network representatives also agreed to the introduction of food policy and migration as new thematic areas and initiated planning for the 2018 Symposium, to be hosted by Ryerson University in Toronto, which will focus on migration, the city and the university.

### Research Interests of New Academic Staff Members



#### Department of Chinese Culture

**Prof. HAN Xiaorong, Professor and Head**

Prof. Han Xiaorong holds a B.A. in history (Xiamen), two master's degrees in ethnic studies (Chinese Academy of Social Sciences) and anthropology (Tulane), and a doctoral degree in history (Hawaii). Since the 1980s, he has conducted interdisciplinary research on the interactions between intellectuals and peasants in China, the relations between state and ethnic minorities in China and Southeast Asia, as well as China's relations with her neighbours, particularly Vietnam. His publications include *Chinese Discourses on the Peasant, 1900-1949* (SUNY, 2005), *Red God: Wei Baqun and His Peasant Revolution in Southern China, 1894-1932* (SUNY, 2014), *Zhongguo minzu guanxi sanlun* (Essays on China's Ethnic Relations, Singapore, World Scientific, 2015), and numerous journal articles. He is currently working on topics related to the Chinese community in northern Vietnam and revolutions on China's frontiers.

Before joining PolyU, Professor Han Xiaorong had held research or teaching positions with the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, University of Hawaii-West Oahu, Trinity College, National University of Singapore, Butler University, and Lingnan University.



#### Department of Chinese Culture

**Prof. JIA Jinhua, Professor**

Jia Jinhua received her doctorate in Comparative Literature from University of Colorado at Boulder. Before joining PolyU, she had been a member/fellow at Institute for Advanced Study (Princeton), National Humanities Center (USA), and Harvard Divinity School, and had taught at University of Macau, City University of Hong Kong, and Xiamen University. Her research interests include Buddhist studies, gender studies, and early to medieval Chinese religion, thought, and literature. She is the author of a number of books and articles, including *Gender, Power, and Talent: Daoist Priestesses in Tang China* (Columbia University Press, 2018); *Li Zehou and Confucian Philosophy* (University of Hawaii Press, 2018; Chinese ed. Shanghai People's Publishing, 2017; coeditor); *New Philology and the Study of Early China* (in Chinese, SPP, 2017, first editor); *Buddhism and the Chinese Tradition* (in Chinese, SPP, 2017); *Gendering Chinese Religion: Subject, Identity, and Body* (State University of New York Press, 2014; first editor), *Study on Classical Chan Buddhism* (Japanese ed. Kyūko shoin, 2017; Chinese ed. Oxford University Press, 2010; SPP, 2013), *The Hongzhou School of Chan Buddhism in Eighth- through Tenth-Century China* (SUNY, 2006); *Anthologies of Gathering and Groups of Poets in the Tang Dynasty* (in Chinese, Peking University Press, 2001 & 2015); etc.



## Department of English

**Prof. Louise CUMMINGS, Professor**

Louise Cummings is Professor in the Department of English at Hong Kong Polytechnic University. She teaches and conducts research in pragmatics and clinical linguistics. Her research also investigates reasoning and uncertainty in the context of public health. She is the author of several books in these areas, most recently *Reasoning and Public Health* (Springer, 2015), *Case Studies in Communication Disorders* (Cambridge University Press, 2016), and *Speech and Language Therapy: A Primer* (Cambridge University Press, 2018). She has also edited *The Routledge Pragmatics Encyclopedia* (Routledge, 2010), *The Cambridge Handbook of Communication Disorders* (Cambridge University Press, 2014), and *Research in Clinical Pragmatics* (Springer, 2017). Her current research examines the language features of different forms of dementia, with emphasis on the non-Alzheimer dementias. Louise is a member of the Royal College of Speech and Language Therapists and is a Fellow of the Higher Education Academy, both in the UK. She is a previous Visiting Fellow in the Department of Philosophy at Harvard University and the Centre for Research in the Arts, Social Sciences, and Humanities (CRASSH) at Cambridge University.



## Department of English

**Dr Nathan John ALBURY, Assistant Professor**

Dr Albury's work resides, in broad terms, within the sociology of language. He especially researches the interplay between language, ethnicity, and politics, meaning his work canvasses language policy, critical multilingualism, nationalism, as well as epistemologies and ideologies of language. He especially talks a grassroots folk linguistic approach to language in society by investigating how community members action what their local, inexperienced or unaccredited knowledge about language and linguistics to construct ideas, discourses and decisions about language in their lives. His work is committed to decolonising sociolinguistics by legitimising more epistemologies of language than those from the West that dominate scholarship. Dr Albury's research has had a wide geographical reach, including Indigenous language revitalisation in New Zealand and Norway, linguistic purism and globalisation in Iceland, Serbia's language policy of dual orthography, multilingualism in the Indian diaspora, and the politics of multilingualism in multiethnic Malaysia.

His work has featured in leading journals including the *Journal of Sociolinguistics*, *Language in Society*, *Lingua*, *Journal of Multilingual and Multicultural Development*, and *Language Policy*. Prior to joining PolyU, Dr Albury was a research fellow at the Center for Multilingualism on Society across the Lifespan at the University of Oslo, and also held senior immigration policy roles in the New Zealand and Australian governments.







### DALS Students' Article Accepted by International Journal of Multilingualism

The article of DALS students Alicia Wong and Susan Chan, 'From 'The World of Suzie Wong' to 'Asia's World City': Tracing the development of bilingualism in Hong Kong's linguistic landscape (1957-2014)', has been accepted for publication by the *International Journal of Multilingualism*.

The article traces the development of bilingualism as a distinguishing feature of Hong Kong's linguistic landscape based on an analysis of photo archive of Hong Kong Year Book collection from 1957 to 2014. The research shows that Hong Kong's bilingual linguistic landscape was a product of the 1980s, during which time Chinese extended from serving a supporting role to becoming the language of power on the previously English dominated public signs of colonial Hong Kong, and English was added to monolingual Chinese private signs as a marker of globalisation. The article is scheduled to be published in January 2018.

#### Distinguished Lecture on Chinese Culture & Religion

Amy Chan, a final-year student of BA (Hons) in English Studies for the Professions from the Faculty is awarded the “Most Outstanding PolyU Student” this year.


