Pragmatics of the Margins – the 16th International Pragmatics Conference

The 16th International Pragmatics Conference (IPrA 2019) was organised by the International Pragmatics Association (IPrA) and hosted by the Department of English at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University on 9-14 June 2019, with sponsorship from the Research Centre for Professional Communication in English (RCPCE), the Hong Kong Academy of the Humanities (HKAH), and John Benjamins Publishing Company. This year's theme – Pragmatics of the Margins – reflected Hong Kong's unique position as a place where post-coloniality, marginalisation and entanglement inform public discourse. The conference is an important networking platform for interdisciplinary scholarly exchange and collaboration in the field of linguistics. It also provides scholars with a snapshot of current trends and developments in the academic fields of inquiry and teaching. This conference was attended by over 950 scholars from 55 countries and regions.

Plenary lectures were given by Prof. Eric Anchimbe (Universität Bayreuth), Prof. Jonathan Culpeper (Lancaster University), Prof. Louise Cummings (The Hong Kong Polytechnic University), Prof. Gu Yueguo (The Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, Beijing), Prof. Meredith Marra (Victory University of Wellington) and Prof. Marina Terkourafi (Universiteit Leiden). Over 800 conference papers explored topics on the themes of margins and entanglements, including quotation in political discourse; the pragmatics of 'global centres' and 'peripheries' in healthcare communication research; gender, employment, language, regionality and class transition; emancipatory pragmatics: probing language usage in diverse contexts; language and legal practice; workplace discourse and intercultural pragmatics, to name a few. A special highlight of the IPrA conference was the poster session, which was held on the penultimate day of the conference and provided conference participants with opportunities to meet up and discuss the posters with the presenters. Other highlights included the presentation of the John J. Gumperz Life-time Achievement Award 2019 to Prof. Elizabeth C. Traugott at the opening ceremony, and presentations for the Best Student Paper Award and Best Student Poster Award at the closing ceremony.

Trends in the Testing of English Language at University Level in Hong Kong and Greater China

Dr Alan Urmston from the English Language Centre, whose main publications and research interests are in language assessment and sociolinguistics, was invited by the Newsletter Editorial Board to talk about trends in the testing of English language at university level in Hong Kong and Greater China.

Testing or assessment exists both within and as a crucial part of the teaching and learning of English language at universities and colleges of higher education, and as an endeavour separated from the other two legs of the three-legged stool that it comprises. That languages are regarded as subjects of study and as skills or proficiencies required of learners and, crucially, of graduates, has led to the testing of languages, and in particular, English, becoming hugely important in both Hong Kong and, increasingly, in Greater China.

In China, the teaching and testing of English at university-level is formalised within the College English curriculum leading to the College English Test (CET), which all non-English major students need to take at Band 4 (during their undergraduate programme) or Band 6 (at the end of their programme, assuming they have already passed Band 4). With English major students taking another test, the Test for English Majors (TEM), which also has two bands (TEM-4 and TEM-8), it has become clear for some time that a common scale or framework was needed so that the results from these tests (and from other tests in China such as the National Matriculation English Test (NMET) or *Gaokao* (高考)) could be compared or equated. A large team of curriculum and testing experts from across the country has been working on such a scale since 2014 and it was formally launched in June 2018 as China's Standards of English Ability (CSE). It consists of nine levels and links all English tests in use in China to a single framework (see figure). In addition, recent work has been completed to link international English tests, such as IELTS, to the CSE, thereby providing Chinese tests of English, such as CET, with international currency.

Framework of China's Standards of English Language Ability

In Hong Kong, universities tend to tie their English language testing practices to their own curricula and they adopt differing policies and practices to suit their own needs. Most could be said to adopt an assessment for learning (AfL) approach as part of their English language provision and recent work by the Hong Kong Continuing Professional Development Hub (HKCPD Hub) for University English Teachers (<https://hkcpdhub.hku.hk>) has facilitated the sharing of ideas in this area. In addition, some local universities also adopt Post Entry Language Assessments (PELAs) for diagnostic, tracking, placement and graduation requirement purposes. At present, there is not a common scale of English language proficiency in use in Hong Kong, though education authorities are looking at the feasibility of using the CSE in this regard. We shall have to watch this space to see if this comes to fruition.

Highlights

PolyU-trained Team Excels in 1st Asia Pacific Linguistics Olympiad

The Hong Kong team jointly trained by PolyU Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies (CBS) and Department of English (ENGL) achieved outstanding results in the first [Asia Pacific Linguistics Olympiad \(APLO\)](#) – winning one silver medal, three bronze medals and four honourable mentions.

Modelling after the International Linguistics Olympiad, APLO is a regional Olympiad for secondary school students which aims to escalate attention to language and linguistics in the Asia Pacific region. The inaugural APLO was held simultaneously in ten countries/regions around the world on 5 May 2019. A total of 264 participants competed to solve problems on diverse languages and writing systems. All eight *official participants*¹ from Hong Kong received awards.

Prof. Chu-ren Huang from the Organising Committee of the [Hong Kong Linguistics Olympiad \(HKLO\)](#), also Chair Professor of PolyU's Department of Chinese and Bilingual Studies, is pleased about the results, noting that the team has only been trained for half a year and the APLO2019 is their first participation in international linguistics Olympiad events. In the APLO award ceremony, Prof. Louise Cummings and Associate Professor Dr Dennis Tay from ENGL and Assistant Professor Dr Stephen Politzer-Ahles from CBS all recognised students' performance in the competition and encouraged students to continue developing interests in languages and linguistics.

Masters of the art of writing were invited to breathe an air of magic into the main event on 17 May. Among them, Prof. Icy Lee, Dr Paul Stapleton, Dr Jason S. Polley, Mr James Shea, and Dr Eddie Tay from Hong Kong Baptist University, The Chinese University of Hong Kong, and The Education University of Hong Kong graced the event. Their narratives encompassed stories from staffrooms of secondary schools to creative projects as capstone papers; from poetry driven from street photography to the unconventional Oulipo poetry movement in Hong Kong. The day ended with the secret use of Google Analytics by students. As you can see, the event could not have been more exciting and thought-provoking.

To tie it all together, a story writing competition sponsored by the Hong Kong Writers Circle, was held and three awardees won by popular vote. CBS & ENGL Launch Revamped BA Programmes

CBS and ENGL have refreshed the curriculum of their BA programmes to address the changing needs of the society. These revamped programmes will be launched from the 2020/21 intake cohort:

BA(Hons) in Linguistics and Translation (BALT) [語言學及翻譯學(榮譽)文學士] JUPAS Code: JS3818

Retitled from BA(Hons) in Chinese and Bilingual Studies, BA(Hons) in Linguistics and Translation consists of two focus areas: 1) linguistics, including speech sciences, and 2) translation, including interpreting and corporate communication. It provides more solid training in both areas and places a much stronger emphasis on the development of information and communication technologies and digital humanities skills for language professionals.

(Remark: The revamped programme is subject to approval.)

BA(Hons) in English Studies for the Professions (BAESP) [專業英語(榮譽)文學士] JUPAS Code: JS3832

The revamped BAESP has three new focal areas, namely *Language Sciences*, *Global Communicative Competence*, and *English for the Professions*. These focal areas reflect important trends in evolving language-related professions and they: 1) provide a clearer articulation of ENGL's teaching/research identity and expertise; 2) allow students greater flexibility to customise their learning pathways; and 3) eventually position themselves in more defined ways in the language-related job market.

ELC2S02 - Fun Day Showcase and Offshore Service

ELC2S02 Serving the Community through Teaching English students who delivered their service at local community centers organised a Fun Day event on 17 March 2019.

The ELC2S02 students designed and delivered English Reading workshops at local community centres for local primary school students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Aside from delivering the workshop content, PolyU students also prepared, together with the students, a performance which could demonstrate the learning outcomes of the workshops. Some groups performed a drama and some even a musical! We could see proud smiles and hear genuine laughter from parents and social workers sitting in the audience. It was one of the best Fun Day Showcases we have ever had. The quality of the performance was very high and the audience could feel the connection between the PolyU students and kids.



Another three groups of *ELC2S02 Serving the Community through Teaching English* students will be delivering their service at Taiwan, Cambodia and Mainland China in late May to early June 2019. As in previous years, the PolyU students write their own original story and prepare a complete teaching kit based on their story during the 13-week semester, and then they deliver what they prepared at their service location. Every year, from the moment we embark on this journey in Week 1 to when we reflect on the journey after the service, PolyU students express how they have become more appreciative towards the opportunities and more attentive to the needs of people around them – their groupmates, their service recipients, and their community.

On-site Interviews by FH for Recruiting International Students

“I was happy and honoured that I was given the opportunity to help with the interview. The candidates reminded me of myself a year ago, when I was still a candidate for admission, feeling excited and anxious for the new chapter I was about to start at PolyU.” Miss Siow Jianya, a current year 1 student from Malaysia recalled.

Jianya joined our on-site interview in Malaysia in early 2019 as a student helper. As an international student, she shared with us after the event, “I met two of my juniors from my alma mater. They were in a dilemma as they were not sure whether coming to Hong Kong was the right decision for them. They also had some concerns about the learning experience and the life in Hong Kong. As a student currently studying at PolyU, I encouraged them to step out from their comfort zone and explore themselves more while they are still young, because PolyU provides students with a lot of international exposures and great learning experiences.”

Meet & Greet @PolyU

On 2 March 2019, 23 Form 4 and Form 5 students from Mu Kuang English School and 15 Form 3 students from Yu Chun Keung Memorial College N.2 came to PolyU and met with 10 PolyU students from different disciplines.

The goals of the Meet & Greet event organised by the English Language Centre were to promote positive attitudes and stimulate an excitement for learning and using English, to familiarise secondary school students with the campus environment and physical facilities, and to provide advice on future studies.

To achieve the goals, PolyU students designed ice-breaking games, language activities, and a PolyU check-point task. They were also responsible for leading the designed activities as well as reflection and sharing sessions.



In their reflections, PolyU students expressed how much they appreciated the experience and exposure and how they have become more confident in designing and delivering tasks with audience-awareness in mind.

A lot of positive feedback was received from the school teachers and representatives from the Education Bureau and they have already asked us for a re-run and a possible expansion of scale in the coming year.

Most of the student participants have never been to a university and surprisingly many of them have never thought about the possibility of studying in a university. According to the school teachers, many of these kids have very low self-esteem and so coming to PolyU and interacting with university students in English have been both mentally and linguistically challenging for them.

About 60 alumni, final year students of BAESP, and academic staff joined this event and it was a good opportunity for bonding among our alumni, students and teachers. 

COBRA Receives EU Horizon 2020 Funding

Congratulations to Prof. Huang Chu-ren(CBS) on being one of the two PIs of a research project entitled [COBRA \(Conversational Brains\)](#), funded by Horizon 2020, which is the biggest EU research and innovation programme through the scheme Marie Skłodowska-Curie actions. Apart from Prof. Huang, a number of CBS and ENGL colleagues also serve as Co-Is of the project.


The purpose of the COBRA project is to train the next generation of researchers to accurately characterise and model the linguistic, cognitive and brain mechanisms that allow conversation to unfold in both human-human and human-machine interactions. The network includes world-level academic research centres on language, cognition and the human brain as well as four non-academic partners that include fast-developing SMEs and one world-level company. The partners' both unique combined expertise and high complementarity will allow COBRA to offer Early-Stage Researchers an excellent training programme as well as very strong exposure to the non-academic sector.

This network consists of 15 PhD projects in EU and one in PolyU, each with clearly spelled out research and synergetic research goals. The students will receive integrated training from leading experts in the COBRA network and learn to work together to lay foundation for this emerging highly interdisciplinary research field: conversational brains. As the only non-EU member, PolyU enriches linguistic and theoretical perspectives of the project; especially the roles of tonal and semantic signals in alignment, and ontological and linguistic models for representation and verification of alignment involving emotion events. PolyU will also host the final Winter School and co-host a PhD project. The PolyU team will build capacity as well as network to position ourselves as world leaders in Chinese language conversational brains study.

This ITN (innovative training network) project consists of a consortium of 17 members (nine formal members and eight partner organisations, with PolyU being the only non-EU member). The partners include:



World Premiere of Dr Pan Lu's Film *Many Undulating Things*

The new film from Dr Pan Lu(CC) and artist Wang Bo, *Many Undulating Things* (湧浪之間), was premiered at the 50th Visions du Réel International Documentary Film Festival held in Nyon, Switzerland, from 5 to 13 April 2019.

Many Undulating Things forms the final part of Dr Pan's long-term artistic research on the history of Hong Kong landscape and urban space, preceded by *Traces of an Invisible City: Three Notes on Hong Kong* (2016) and [Miasma, Plants, Export Paintings](#) (2017). The film offers a complex reflection on the relationships between landscape, nature, urbanisation and society. Spanish Filmmaker and critic Elena López Riera acclaimed *Many Undulating Things* as a "political poem" which questions the function of cities in the development of the capitalist system.

Joint Postgraduate Student Symposium 2019

On April 26 2019, the Joint Postgraduate Student Symposium (JPSS 2019) on Language, Culture, and Cognition was held by the Department of Chinese Culture, at AG710 of The Hong Kong Polytechnic University.



This year, we received more than 70 abstracts from within and outside Hong Kong. Only 18 remarkable papers were selected due to the time limit. Among the presenters, four were from PolyU, nine from other universities in Hong Kong, three from the Chinese mainland and two from Taiwan.

Prof. Han Xiaorong (Head of CC) and Dr Mark Meulenbeld (Associate Professor, CC) gave a wonderful welcoming speech and opening remark respectively. During the Q&A session, both presenters and audience engaged in active discussion. Mr Tai Kwun Ho's paper on “人格救國：余日章的救國思想” and Mr Zhang Zhen's paper on “‘按勞分配’與‘人心’：從《人類創造力的大發揮大表現》思考 1950 年代後期的梁漱溟”, won the best paper awards.

ENGL PhD Graduate Wins LSHK Outstanding Thesis Award

Dr Leo Liu, 2018 PhD graduate of ENGL, won the Outstanding Thesis Award presented by the Linguistics Society of Hong Kong (LSHK) for excellence on his thesis titled Examining syntactic complexity in EFL academic writing.

Dr Liu's winning thesis investigates syntactic complexity (SC) of advanced L2 writing, with SC understood as the sophistication and variety of meaning-making linguistic devices available in the grammar of EAP. It aims to identify areas of syntactic complexity where EFL student writers lag greatly behind expert writers, which can be pedagogically taken up in EAP instruction.

Findings of the study have theoretical contributions to make for L2 syntactic complexity research and practical implications for EAP pedagogy in EFL contexts.

Featured Talks Hosted by ELC in Collaboration with AHKLC

ELC recently organised two featured talks in collaboration with the Association of Hong Kong Language Centres (AHKLC), which aims to advocate for the interests of the members of the Association, encourage scholarship, facilitate international contacts, promote the status of language centres and their staff, and facilitate cross-centre initiatives.

“40 Years of the NMET - Its Impact and Implications” on 14 December 2018 by Prof. Gu Xiandong
Prof. Gu Xiandong is Director of the Research Centre of Language, Cognition, and Language Application, Chongqing University, China. The National Matriculation English Test (NMET) is one of the most high-stakes English tests for university students in the Chinese mainland, and hence it has an impact on which students are selected from the Chinese mainland into universities in Hong Kong. In her talk, Prof. Gu shared her experiences studying for the NMET and later in dealing with developments of the NMET across the Chinese mainland. Actual examples from students taking the NMET were featured and discussed. The talk and discussion led to a greater and deeper understanding of how the NMET factors into teaching and learning across the country.

“The challenges and dilemmas of teaching EAL students across the disciplines in English-medium higher education. Is there a role for plurilingual pedagogical approaches?” on 11 January 2019 by Dr Steve Marshall
Dr Steve Marshall is an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Education at Simon Fraser University, Vancouver, Canada. In his talk, Professor Marshall discussed how the internationalisation of tertiary education in Canada, along with friendly immigration policies, has attracted hundreds of thousands of international students, the majority from Asia. Dr Marshall then went on to share how he and other educators use plurilingual teaching approaches, allowing students' dominant languages to become an asset – i.e. “tools for learning” – in discussing content and understanding concepts. In turn, the controversial nature of allowing a multitude of languages to be used in the learning environment was discussed, in particular how it has had an impact on social groups, stakeholders and assessments. The talk helped to shed light on similar challenges facing Hong Kong in the context of bilingualism and second language learning.


ELC Reading Club's Second Book Exchange


