Objectives	Cross-cultural contact is an inevitable feature of the global era, especially in cosmopolitan centres such as Hong Kong, where people with different cultural backgrounds come together every day. Yet, for its frequent occurrences that at times give rise to mutual understanding and respect, such contact is also rife with mishaps, resulting in tension and even conflicts. This subject will shed light on the nature of such contact through the study of records of some of the impressions that Chinese and westerners have had on each other since the mid-nineteenth century, such as travelogues, diaries, memoirs and imaginative literary works. In addition, students will analyze critically the cultural assumptions that shape the encounters between China and the West, including the underlying colonial, religious, commercial, intellectual and political drives. Students will develop a culturally sensitive attitude in the process, and apply what they learn from the subject to similar cross- cultural situations that they experience or witness in their lives. This subject will include substantial reading and writing assignments for the fulfillment of the Chinese Reading and Writing Requirements in Chinese session.

<b>Teaching/Learning</b> <b>Methodology</b> (Note 3)	The basic content knowledge of the subject will be taught in a combination of lectures and tutorials. Students will be asked to submit written responses to the readings. The final assignment is a book review, where students have to bring to bear all the key concepts that they learn from the subject to the discussion of the book. Early in the semester, the teacher will also help students to design a small project that will enable them to reflect on the cross-cultural interactions they experience in their lives.
