# Teaching/Learning Methodology

The course comprises two 50-minute lectures and one 50-minute tutorial each week. Pre-class readings will be supplemented by the use of pictorials, audio and video materials in the lectures. Students are also required to watch media items for tutorial discussion. At the beginning of the semester students will be assigned a thematic issue to be studied for oral presentations in the tutorials. Students are required to prepare the final essay with research element.
