



A lot of us love Chinese White Dolphins – also called pink dolphins – but they may soon disappear!

Facts

First recorded: In Hong Kong near the Pearl River in 1637

Life expectancy: Up to **40** years

Habitat type: Shallow waters near shores

Skin colour: Calves are grey and spotty. The spots would fade and the skin colour would change to White when they grow older. The dolphins appear pink due to the ventilation (passing of blood and oxygen) underneath the skin.

- They are facing these Threats
- Coastal development
 - Land reclamation
 - Heavy marine traffic
 - Water pollution
 - Over-fishing

According to the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department's statistics for 2019, there are **52** pink dolphins left in the coastal waters around Lantau Island.
