The Editors of Tourism Recreation Research (TRR) extend their congratulations to Professors Stefan Gössling, Michael Hall, Paul Peeters and Daniel Scott for winning the Article of the Year Award 2010 for their contribution, *The Future of Tourism: Can Tourism Growth and Climate Policy be Reconciled? A Mitigation Perspective*, published in TRR Volume 35(2), 2010. The judges ranked it high in Practical Usability of Research and Broad Subject Interest.

Stefan Gössling is a Professor at the Department of Service Management, Lund University and the School of Business and Economics, Lund University, Sweden. He is also a research coordinator at the Research Centre for Sustainable Tourism, Western Norway Research Institute. Having worked with tourism, mobility, energy and greenhouse gas emissions for over 15 years, he is now increasingly interested in the sociological and psychological dimensions of human mobility.



Michael Hall is Professor in the Department of Management, University of Canterbury, New Zealand; Docent, Department of Geography, Oulu University, Finland; and Visiting Professor, Linneaus University, Kalmar, Sweden and Sheffield Business School, Sheffield Hallam, UK. Co-editor of *Current Issues in Tourism* he has wide-ranging interests in tourism and mobility, regional studies, environmental history and gastronomy.



Paul Peeters is an Associate Professor at the Center for Sustainable Tourism and Transport, NHTV University for Applied Science, Breda, The Netherlands. He specializes in the impacts of tourism on the environment in general and climate change in particular. His publications cover a wide range of topics like air transport technology, global and regional tourism and climate scenario's, system dynamic approaches to tourism and tourism transport mode choice and modal shift.



Daniel Scott is a Canada Research Chair in Global Change and Tourism at the University of Waterloo (Canada). He has worked on the human dimensions of climate change for over 10 years, focusing primarily on the implications for the global tourism economy and protected areas management. Scott has been a contributing author and expert reviewer for the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change Third and Forth Assessment Reports. He is currently a member of the Advisory Committee to the UN coordinated Global Partnership for Sustainable Tourism and on the panel of experts for the Commission for Climatology of the World Meteorological Organization.
