	It consists of 100% continuous assessment through class exercises (60%) and written test (40%). Class exercises include in-class Q & A activities, student presentation, tutorial assignments, and lab as well as group projects. Through these class exercises, students will be assessed about the fundamental knowledge in spatial information system and the practical capabilities of performing spatial data modeling, analysis, and manipulation using actual data sets. Problem based learning is carried out during the Q & A and tutorials, and is reinforced by assignments. Presentation, lab and group project contribute to the all round development of students. Written test is designed to monitor student learning at knowledge level. Students are expected to achieve a minimum standard to be able to obtain a passing grade in line with criterion referenced assessment approach.
