What will students do to serve?	You will team up with local students to assess the health status, examine the lifestyle pattern and living environment of families in slums or other rural areas. Based on your interview, observation and assessment, you will develop a health profile of the families and examine the factors leading to their health issues. You will then come up with health promotion suggestions for the families on what habit and behaviors can be changed to achieve a healthier lifestyle. The proposed idea should fit in their social life, culture, and religion, rather than be advocating drastic lifestyle changes that may be difficult to sustain.  Upon completion of the subject, you will understand the challenges and needs in maintaining a healthy lifestyle in developing communities. You will learn the techniques to interview people's health status and risk factors, conduct basic health assessments, and develop a personalized health promotion plan. You will also learn to behave sensitively, appreciate cultural and religious diversity.  The service project will take place offshore during Summer Term. In total, students will be expected to spend 40 hours in direct contact with the people, to a total of 5 days during Summer Term.  We envision that the service-learning project tentatively as follows:  Day 1+2: Visits and interviews to targeted families living in the slums/ developing communities.  Day 3: Investigative visit to neighboring place / markets; development of proposal on healthy lifestyle for client families
