School collaborates with Fire Services to enhance emergency preparedness

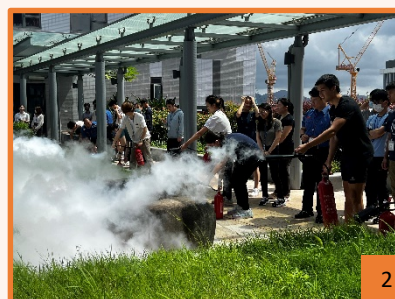


Prof. David Shum, Dean of the Faculty of Health and Social Sciences, and Mr Andy Yeung, Director of FSD, witnessed the signing of the MoU by Prof. E Angela Chan, Interim Head & Professor of the School, and Mr Yiu Men-yeung, the Commandant of the FASA.

PolyU and the Fire Services Department (FSD) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on 7 June to establish a collaborative partnership between the School and the Fire and Ambulance Services Academy (FASA) in jointly offering a cluster area requirement subject, *Fundamentals of Emergency Care and Critical Response* for all PolyU undergraduate students.

The subject equips PolyU students with knowledge and skills on basic life-support, mental health first aid, fire safety measures and emergency evacuation procedures to enhance their emergency awareness, preparedness, and response, as well as communication skills for offering psychological support to peers or persons in emotional crisis.

Following the signing of the MOU, the first one-day workshop was launched on 20 June, with 48 students attended the training at FASA. The workshop covered a wide range of topics, including cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), automated external defibrillators (AED), fire safety and use of fire extinguishers, basic first aid skills, and a tour of the FASA's facilities. The student feedback was positive and they said that the workshop was interactive, enjoyable and informative. Some students reported feeling more confident and prepared to help others in emergency situations after attending the workshop.

Forty PolyU students taking the service learning subject *Healthy Lifestyle Challenges for Developing Communities*, together with their teachers* visited Phnom Penh, Cambodia, between 5 to 14 June to carry out the service learning projects. They collaborated with a local secondary school, True Vision International School, to provide cognitive and nutritional assessment and education to older people living in the rural area in Phnom Penh. Over 100 older people received the service.

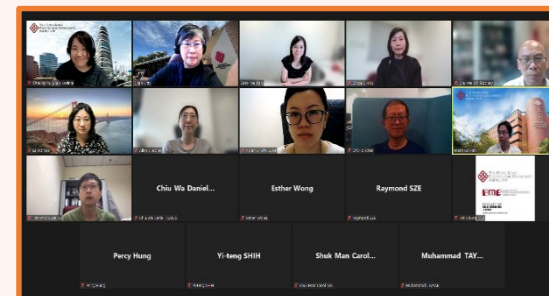
Update on Virtual Hospital

The Virtual Hospital team was nominated by the University to present their innovation at the 2023 ASAIHL [The Association of Southeast Asian Institutions of Higher Learning] Conference, organised by Soka University in Japan on 10 to 12 June. Following the presentation, Assistant Dean for International Relations and Research Collaborations of Mahidol University, Thailand, approached the team and expressed their interest in Virtual Hospital. The opportunity of collaborating with the School on this educational innovation has been explored. If an agreement is reached, Virtual Hospital will probably go beyond Mainland China and extend its influence in Asia.

Teams awarded nearly 4.5 mil for carrying out three dementia care projects

Dr Patrick Kor (Principal Investigator), Assistant Professor, and his team* have been awarded HK\$ 1.5 million from the Bright Future Charitable Foundation, for carrying out the project titled ‘Effects of a Technology-Enhanced Horticultural Program for the People with Dementia and Their Family Caregivers’.

Dr Wang Shanshan (Principal Investigator)#, Research Assistant Professor, and **Dr Daphne Cheung** (Principal Investigator)+, Associate Professor, have been awarded nearly HK\$ 1.5 million respectively from the General Research Fund of the Research Grants Council. Dr Wang’s project studies the effectiveness of telephone-coached "graphic narrative" bibliotherapy for informal caregivers of people with dementia, while Dr Cheung’s team will explore the effects of an Individualized Music Playlist based on the ISO-Principle for the immediate de-escalation of agitation in people with dementia.

Awardees of Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Scheme announced

Mr Tenaw Lebeza, from Ethiopia and Ms Hu Yule from Mainland China have been awarded the Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Scheme 2023-24, granted by the Research Grants Council. Mr Lebeza will be supervised by **Dr Vivian Ngai**, Associate Professor. Ms Hu will be supervised by **Prof. Angela Leung**, Associate Head (Research) & Professor and **Dr Li Yan**, Assistant Professor (Presidential Young Scholar).

Food Angel turns delivery female workers into community health workers with the support of nurses and mHealth

Dr Arkers Wong⁺, Assistant Professor, received a donation of over HK\$11 million from the Li Ka Shing Foundation to carry out a project aimed at training food delivery female workers from Food Angel (惜食堂) to perform basic health check for older adults living alone in the community.

After the training, the delivery female workers will be equipped with basic health knowledge and the ability to measure physical vital signs, including blood oxygen level, blood pressure, and pulse and pain indices of around 100 older adults when they visit them to deliver meals. The health data collected by the delivery workers will be uploaded to the mHealth monitoring platform, developed by Dr Wong's research team. Registered nurses (RNs) access to the platform to evaluate the health status of the older adults. When needed, a registered nurse will give in-depth personal care and interventions via the mHealth app to the older adult. Referrals to allied health professionals or social workers can also be made by the RNs for early interventions.

The team hope that this **FIRST**-of-its-kind grassroots community health model in combination with **Health-Social Partnership** will provide scientific research evidence for the Government to consider introducing the mHealth app and the service model to the community as a way to strengthen primary health care.

The mHealth app, is a pilot health management mobile app with an interactive nurse support function. The app enables nurses to monitor users' health status and allow users' to communicate with nurses when they have health concerns. Research findings released by the team in March this year showed that the use of the app for three to six months among the older adults resulted in a significant increase in self-efficacy, a significant decrease in depression level, a reduction in the use of medical services, and an improvement in the quality of life.

Co-leaders at GBA institutes to explore collaborative research possibilities & gave talks

Prof. Frances Wong (left photo: 2nd row, 3rd from left), Chair Professor of Advanced Nursing Practice & Associate Dean of the Faculty of Health and Social Sciences, & Co-leader of the Area of Excellence (AoE), visited the School of Nursing of Sun Yat-sen University, Mainland China, on 11 May to discuss conducting collaborative research in the proposed Joint Primary Health Care Centre at PolyU, which involves institutes of the Greater Bay Area.

Another Co-leader of AoE, **Dr Yang Lin** (right photo), Associate Professor, gave invited talks about AI and Big Data in Healthcare in three different institutes in Mainland China in April and July. They are the School of Public Health, Sun Yat-sen University; the School of Public Health, Southern Medical University, Guangzhou; and during a workshop held by the Maternal and Child Hospital of Hubei Province, Huazhong University of Science and Technology in Wuhan.



Results of first parenting programme adopting ACT released

The School and the Christian Family Service Center held a press conference to announce the results of the first parenting programme (賽馬會「家•添晴」家長支援計劃) in Hong Kong that adopted Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT) to reduce parental stress. **Dr Mak Yim Wah** (Associate Professor), Advisor of the programme, found that ACT could effectively motivate the parents to adopt a more effective and harmonious parenting style, enhance their psychological flexibility, and reduce their stress, anxiety and depression caused by parenting, which resulted in improvement in quality of life of the parents and their children.

Fourth nursing student awarded Innovation and Technology Scholarship

Mr Killian Tang, our year-3 general nursing student, was among the four PolyU students awarded the Innovation and Technology Scholarship this year. He is also the FOURTH nursing student who has received this award. Killian and his team received a grant from the Cyberport Creative Microfund earlier to develop an innovative insole called PRESOLE that uses AI technology for continuous monitoring of foot pressure distribution for reducing pain problems. As an awardee, Killian will receive up to HK\$150,000 for participation in various elite-training. He is planning to attend the Health and Technology summer course at King's College London and join an exchange programme at the National University of Singapore. His goal is to learn more about advanced technology and integrate technology to create more new innovations for nursing care in the future.

The Innovation and Technology Scholarship is jointly organised by the Innovation and Technology Commission, HSBC, and The Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups.

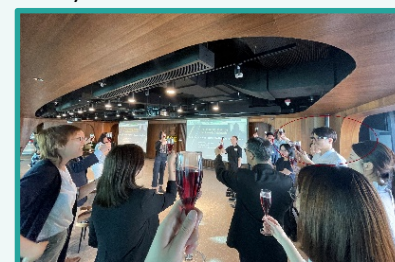

The Youth Quitline, Operated by our nursing students, had helped 30% of the youth smokers who joined the service (638 persons) to quit smoking successfully within six months. Among those who had not yet quit in 6 months, 15.3 % had reduced their cigarette consumption at least by half.

Earlier on 19 May, Dr Eva Ho (photo 2) and Dr Katherine Lam, Research Assistant Professor, (photo 3) represented the Youth Quitline and the School respectively, to express concerns in the Legislative Council meeting over the proposed relaxation of the current ban on trans-shipment of alternative smoking products (such as e-cigarettes, heated tobacco products, etc.) via Hong Kong for re-export to overseas markets, which may result in these products being diverted back into the community.

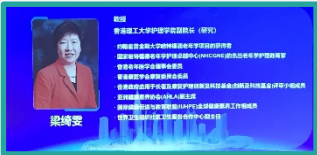
