# **PolyU-OPTOMETRY -** CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR REGISTERED OPTOMETRISTS (PART IV)

Continuing Education for registered optometrists (Part IV) to prepare them for Part II registration has come to fruition. After the Optometrist Board agreed on the syllabus, the School of Optometry began to prepare a CE programme in late 2008. The programme 'Continuing Education Courses in Optometry' consists of a total of six courses (Basic Science (Optometry), Ocular and Visual Science, Clinical and Professional Practice I (Optometry), Clinical and Professional Practice II (Optometry), Clinical and Professional Practice III (Optometry) and Clinical and Professional Practice IV (Optometry). The courses are offered over 3-4 years on a part-time basis (1.5 days/week). The primary aim of these courses is to provide registered optometrists (Parts III and IV) in Hong Kong with the fundamental knowledge and skills in Optometry to prepare them for registration into Part II or Part III. Candidates who passed all six courses may apply for a Certificate



of Attainment in Optometry (Part II) and will be eligible to register in Part II of the Optometrist Register. Those who passed the first five courses only may apply for a Certificate of Attainment in Optometry (Part III) and will be eligible to register in Part III of the Register. The Board has previously approved a pathway for those registered under Part II of the Register to move on to Part I through further education.

Despite the cost and time, 31 Optometrists enrolled in Course 1 which began in January 2010. When asked about their experience of Course 1, most candidates expressed appreciation of new knowledge learned and many are looking forward to Course 2. It is indeed reassuring to see their enthusiasm and their understanding of the importance of lifelong learning to advance their knowledge to help them improve service to their patients.

### Vision Screening for the Special Olympics

### Clinic and School Retreats

Jointly organized by the School and the Zhongshan Ophthalmic Center (ZOC), Sun Yat-sen University, the 7th Joint Research Day was successfully held at PolyU on 30 January 2010. Besides participation from our School and ZOC, researchers from Department of Anatomy and the Eye Institute of the University of Hong Kong also joined this occasion and presented their research findings. The research day provided over 70 researchers from different institutions and different disciplines a unique platform to share and



discuss their latest results in eye research.

The event kicked off with opening remarks by Prof. George Woo, Dean (FHSS), followed by 11 presentations covering a broad spectrum of eye research including diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, binocular function, Lycium barbarum for neuroprotection, retinopathy of prematurity and proliferative vitreoretinopathy. 





### OUR RESEARCH

### **Dry Eye Research**

Dry eye is one of the most common age-related eye problems. Over 50% of people aged 50 years in the world are dry eye sufferers. This is particularly relevant to Hong Kong, as the tear quality and quantity in Hong Kong Chinese is poorer than that in Caucasians. If the problem is untreated, dry eye can lead to ulceration and scarring of the cornea, and loss of vision. Most research into dry eye has focused on the deficit of tear volume, but little has been done to determine how the composition, characteristics and action of artificial tears may be changed in the dry eye patient. Current treatment is based on artificial tears, which are instilled into the eye at regular intervals. This leads to a temporary and often very short relief from symptoms, but does




not address the causes of dry eye development, which remain unknown. The anterior ocular surface is exposed directly to oxidants generated by, for example, ultraviolet radiation and environmental pollutants. Oxidative damage may, therefore, play a role in dry eye development. The tear film bathes the cornea and antioxidants within the tears may have an important role to protect against these damaging agents.

Free Radicals, the harmful oxidants found inside our body, were first described by Nobel Prize Winner, Gerhand Herzberg, opening the frontier on the study of using antioxidants to lower the risk and delay the onset of disease. Our research team is the first to study the total antioxidant activity in human tears, and has pioneered the use of well-established biomarkers of oxidant/antioxidant balance, the FRAP assay (US patented, with IP belonging to PolyU) to investigate various aspects of tear antioxidants, including stability, variability, source, relationship with plasma levels, and the effect of antioxidant supplementation. We found that human tears have a total antioxidant activity of 409\*162 µM, and two powerful antioxidants, ascorbate and urate, constituted around half of the total in human tears. The report has been published in the high impact journal (Investigative Ophthalmology and Visual Science) and was found to be the 15 most-read IOVS (Investigative Ophthalmology and Visual Science) article of 2009, paving the way for the new direction of dry eye study in the world. To date, we have identified several tear antioxidants including ascorbate, urate, cysteine, glutathione, tyrosine and lactoferrin. The findings have resulted in a patent filed for a novel formulation of artificial tear ophthalmic solution. This year, the study is supported by a government grant (UGC) to investigate the mechanism and the treatment of dry eye disease. Results will give an insight into



improved treatment for dry eye and support the novel formulation of ophthalmic solution (in particular for artificial tears with physiological antioxidant) development.
